Firemen's Dance Brings in \$400, Termed 'Success'

The annual New Year's dance of the Sandy Fire Department was a "great success," Chief Lyle Seaman said Thursday.

The affair earned about \$400 for the department's general operating fund, he said. About 200 persons attended the dance Saturday night at the Odd Fellows Hall and stepped to the music of Beer's and Field's orchestra.

Otto Spaller was winner of a \$25 cash prize, given by George Beers to the person selling the most tickets to the dance. Mr. Spaller earned the prize by disposing of 206 ducats, Mr. Beers said.

Ice Raised Fears
"We were afraid that the icy roads Saturday night would keep people home," Chief Seaman said. "But we had a very nice turnout." Part of the money raised by the dance will help pay the cost of erecting a new garage for two of the Fire Department's four vehicles. One of them, the ambulance, is parked on the street when not in use because no storage space is available, the chief pointed out.

Funds from the annual dance also help to defray operating expenses of the department's fire protection work in Sandy and its rural surroundings.

Postal Rates for Air Mail, Other Services Raised

Uncle Sam, many residents in this area believe, hasn't heard that prices are beginning to drop.

Monday surprised Post Office customers found that many postal rates—including air mail, parcel post and others—had been upped. Letters sent air mail now cost 6 cents an ounce. Before the increase, which became effective Jan. 1, each ounce cost five cents.

But economy-minded persons also learned they could send an air mail post card for only four cents.

Overseas Service
These new air mail rates included service between the continental United States and such points as Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, Virgin Islands, Guam, Canada and Mexico. Also to and from members in the armed forces overseas, and civilians authorized to receive mail in Army or Fleet Post Offices.

Fees for money orders, special delivery letters, registered mail and parcel post were raised also. Persons were advised to check with postal authorities for these new rates.

One bright note remained: Letters would still be borne to their destinations via rail or motor transportation with the familiar three-cent stamp affixed.

92 of County's Graduate Nurses Practice in Area

Of the 172 graduate nurses living in Clackamas County, 92 are practicing their profession in the county and 40 are employed in Portland, a recent survey conducted by the Oregon State Nurses Association revealed.

Forty are practicing in Portland, three are in work other than nursing and 37 graduate nurses have retired, the survey disclosed. It was conducted for the association by Miss Ruth Gainere, supervisor of nursing in the county health office in Oregon City.

The study was part of a statewide attempt to learn how many nurses would be available for duty. Oregon is the first state to make such a survey.
