Sandy High Notes

Girls were forbidden to speak to boys in the school she attended during the war in Chile, Kathle. Forbes, Sandy High junior, said in an interview published in the Sandy Hi Times, weekly school paper. Miss Forbes attended a British school for girls.

Boys and girls went to separate schools, she added, and the girls were "penalized" for speaking to boys. This, she said, "led many to be dishonest and rebellious in secret."

Other oddities of this foreign school were, Miss Forbes said:

Teachers Called "Miss"
The principal was called the head master; grades were called "forms"; teachers were addressed as "Miss" whether they were married or single; boys bowed and girls curtsied when meeting a teacher, and a period was called a "full stop" while a comma was called a "short stop."

Each of the schools in this country had their own, distinctive uniform for students. Most of the teachers were spinsters and wore the Victorian styled clothes fashionable at the time they left England. The clothing, Kathleen pointed out, was "very much out of style by 1943."

Buyers of Men's Shirts Get Hints

No fair cribbing on this one—how many buttons are there on the front of a man's dress shirt? That's one of the quality points to check, according to Miss Lucy Lane, Oregon State College specialist in clothing and textiles, when buying a shirt. On a good shirt the buttons fit into button holes that are re-inforced at both ends, and the holes are centered in the center panel. In a striped shirt, moreover, the buttonholes are centered on the stripe.

Check Collar Tips
Miss Lane says other points to check are these: Be sure cuffs will open flat to prevent undue strain on the placket when cuffs are ironed. Check the collar tips to be sure they are the same length. Check stitching to see it is small—18 or 19 stitches per inch.

Pre-shrunk shirts are most satisfactory, Miss Lane declares. Examine the inner surface of shirts with printed patterns, she adds. Printing can and sometimes does cover flaws in the fabric. Softer fabrics have the highest number of threads per square inch.

Answer to the button question: A good dress shirt has six buttons down the front. And it may not be a top quality shirt if it doesn't, concludes Miss Lane.

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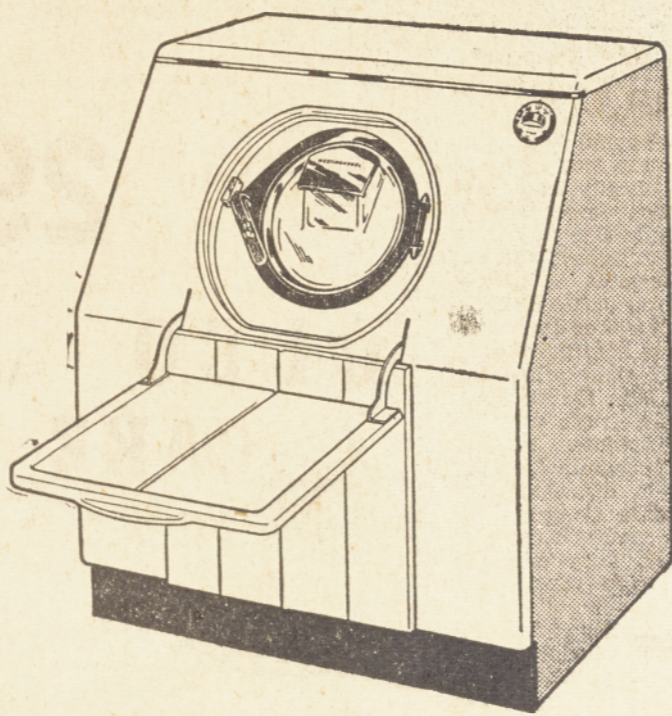
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
