### Berry Meeting Slated Tuesday

A berry growers' meeting will be held all day Tuesday, Jan. 18, in the Sandy High School gymnasium, Leon Garoian, Clackamas County extension agent, announced Thursday.

The gathering will begin at 10 a.m. and close at 3 p.m., he said. The program will include a panel discussion led by John J. Inskeep, county agent, and speeches by the following specialists from Oregon State College:

Dr. R. E. Stephenson, soil scientist, who will speak on soils fertilizing; Dr. Ed Vaughn, plant pathologist, diseases of berries; Robert Every, entomology specialist, insect pests of berries; Rex Warren, crops specialist, and Clive Cook, extension agent, weed sprays for strawberry fields, and R. Ralph Clark, strawberry plant certification program.

The panel to be led by Mr. Inskeep will be made up of the following growers in the Sandy area: Glen Schaeffer, Pete Packard, Charles Thatcher and Eldon Snider. The group will discuss methods of reducing costs of production.


Following the talk the movie was shown to the parents and teachers. It was followed by a round table discussion on the movie.
