Club Airs Loop, Police Problems

Sheriff Says Office Lacks Needed Funds
Law enforcement and Loop Highway pedestrian safety improvement came under the guns of Mt. Hood Pow-Wowers last Thursday night. Over 50 members met with County Sheriff Fred Reakecker and State Traffic Engineers Al Head and Val Johnson at the Fireside.

Pow-Wowers got little satisfaction but a lot of background. Sheriff Reakecker spoke bluntly: "You all know the story," he said. "Clackamas county does not have much money and law enforcement is a forgotten thing. Not enough money is budgeted for such purposes. It's taken me eight years to increase our force from five men to eleven. That includes the sheriff."

Not Many Men
"Three men act as jailors. There's a chief deputy, an executive deputy, a process server, a stenographer, and three night patrolmen. And that's it. Considering the fact that these men must relieve each other for days off, it does not leave many men to enforce the law."

Lou Norene, Zig-Zag, confronted the state traffic engineers with the problem of pedestrian safety on the Loop. Mr. Norene had been appointed at the last meeting of the War Council to investigate the problem.

He reported, "There are only about three places on the Loop that pedestrians are in danger. Those places are Wemme, Zig-Zag and Rhododendron."

Need Wider Shoulders
"Probable recommendations we will make are speed zones, signs and wider shoulders," replied Mr. Head after a round table discussion. During the discussion, Mr. Head gave accident analysis statistics which showed the accident ratio was 17 per mile between Sandy and Gresham, 10 between Government Camp and the Wapinitia Cut Off, and only five between Sandy and Government Camp.

He stressed the fact that signs do not do much good if they are not enforced.

Big Chief Jack S. Greenwood presided at the meeting.

SENTENCE SUSPENDED
A 90-day jail sentence for Don Armstrong, 18, Government Camp, who pleaded guilty last week to a petty larceny charge, was suspended by Circuit Judge E. C. Latourette on condition the youth joined the army. Young Armstrong was arrested on complaint of a Government Camp ski shop.

Sandy Fumbles Ragged Hoop Tilt

Dallas Wins 34 to 28 By Sinking Free Shots

The Sandy Pioneers were back in a slump Tuesday night when Dallas out-scored them 34-28 in a ragged Willamette Valley League basketball tilt on the Pioneer court.

Outstanding attraction for the evening's activities was the Sandy high school band which played during half-time period. Under the direction of Elgin Burns, the band played school songs and even whipped into a swing number which set the crowd of 200 clapping their hands in rhythm with the tune.

The sharp shooting of Dave Hopp from outside the key was the only thing that kept the Pioneers in the ball game. Hopp bagged 13 points to take high point honors for the fray.

Equal Field Goals
Both squads connected with the same number of field goals. Free throws won the game for Dallas. Dallas made 8 free tosses out of 19 attempts. Sandy made 2 out of 13.

Dallas shot 56 times from the floor and connected for 13 field goals. Sandy took 64 tries and swished 13.

Lob passes and wild throws marred the play of both squads. The Dragons man-to-man defense befuddled the Pioneers. Most of the time the Pioneers dribbled themselves into a corner.

Failed Easy Shots
Dallas played just as poorly. Most of their counters were made from outside the key. Neither team seemed to be able to work the ball in for an easy shot.

Harlow Loucks, tall, lanky center, was back in uniform for the Pioneers. His hard-to-stop push shot accounted for four counters, but he was not up to his usual good play off the backboards. It was his first league game.

Coach Chuck Croston commented after the game. "We were really off. The boys just could not get going. Hopp was about the only one who could find the basket."

Frederickson, Weisendorffer, Bobby Reynolds, and Hopp sparked the Pioneer attack. And it was licking. Sandy took over the lead right at the start of the fray and racked up a 16-4 count at the end of the first canto.

In the second quarter, the Bulldogs began breaking through the Pioneer's pressing zone defense and at half time closed the score 24-20, Sandy still on top.

The Pioneers switched at the beginning of the third stanza to a tight zone defense to stop the Bulldog onslaught. Both teams played even throughout the quarter which closed with Sandy on the long end of a 30-27 score.

Bulldogs Take Lead
Things tightened up in the fourth canto. The Bulldogs pushed into the lead with only four minutes to play, 35-34. The Pioneer defense began to hold the Bulldogs. With 12 seconds left to play, Frederickson swished a push shot from the side line to put the game on ice, 38-35.
