All-Glass Contraction Condenses Fruit Juice

A fruit juice concentrator that can reduce a gallon of juice to two pints while retaining all of the normal flavor and color has been built by William F. Filz, a member of the research and teaching staff of the food technology department at Oregon State college.

Built entirely of glass, the apparatus permits observation of every step in the process from applying steam to a miniature "boiler" on through the distillation process where water and volatile aromatic compounds are taken off. So far as known this is the first all-glass concentrator built. It was made possible by the fact that Mr. Filz is an accomplished glass blower.

Aside from its use in research the apparatus may have condensed value in preparing condensed juice and flavoring materials in this fruit growing region for shipment throughout the country at much reduced cost compared with natural juices. As the condensation is done under partial vacuum at low temperature, quality is not impaired.

Growers Hear Spraying Advice

Problems in selecting spray equipment, pumps, nozzles and booms were discussed at a berry growers meeting last Thursday at the Bud Nelson farm in Kelso.

M. G. Huber, Oregon State College extension engineer, was present to discuss with the 47 farmers who attended the meeting different phases of selecting spray equipment.

"Plunger type pumps," stated Mr. Huber, "are most satisfactory for materials used in cane berry spraying. Due to the abrasive nature of spray materials used to control diseases, excessive wear may occur on gear type pumps, causing a loss in operating pressure."

Although plunger type pumps are higher in original cost, in the long run they are less expensive than gear pumps, he told the crowd.

Anthraxose diseased black cap and red raspberry canes, and boysenberry canes infected with leaf and cane spot, were passed among the group to acquaint berry growers with these diseases. Both infections, fungus in nature, are controlled by lime-sulphur spray, one gallon to nine gallons of water.

Many of the growers present indicated the black caps and red raspberries would be sprayed this year for control of these fungus diseases. If improved weather conditions prevail, numerous strawberry growers said they plan to spray their fields with oil to control weeds.

Local spray equipment dealers and Portland distributors had on display models of their equipment. A similar meeting was held last Wednesday in Oregon City with 55 growers attending.
