Lutheran Church Members, Groups Sponsor Overseas Aid Since 1945

Christian faith in action has been the keynote of the three and a half year war relief program of Immanuel Lutheran Church. Carried on by the church, its organizations and individual members, it has helped many families made destitute by the war.

Plans for the program were made in cooperation with the Lutheran Church, Missouri synod even before the end of World War II. In the year 1945 members of Immanuel Lutheran Church contributed over \$1,100 toward a church-wide peace-thank offering, to be used for spiritual and physical relief in the war-torn countries. In the following year another \$500 was given.

At the same time large amounts of clothing were gathered and shipped to Europe and China for distribution. In cooperation with the Emergency Planning Council of the Lutheran Church, food and clothing was purchased from U. S. Army surplus and in Denmark and Switzerland. This was distributed through established relief organizations in France, Poland, Germany, and Italy.

Made \$50 Gift

The Walther League, youth group of the church, in the fall of 1946, made an initial contribution of \$50 for food packages which were sent to five European families. At the same time a family of four, living in the British zone of Germany was adopted by the group. Two packages of food have been sent to this family each month since that time. Also, the family was outfitted with necessary clothing.

In the fall of 1947 another family of six was adopted. Until a number of months ago the youth group's expenditures for relief amounted to \$30 a month. This has now been reduced to \$15 a month because of the improved circumstances of these families.

Edward Ulrich, Mrs. Reuben Ulrich, Eldon Kahny, Mrs. Rodrick Binger, and Leonard Fuerstenau have had charge of the program for the league.

Adopted Orphan Girl

Immanuel Lutheran Ladies' Aid has since 1945 cooperated with the national Lutheran Women's Missionary League in the establishment and maintenance of five orphanages in France and Germany. Aside from this the group is sponsoring an eight-year-old orphan girl at one of these orphanages. Packages of food, clothing or notions are sent each month. Mrs. Carl R. Neumann has been in charge of these monthly mailings.

Individual families of the church have also helped to expand this program by adopting families of their own, to whom they have been sending packages of food and clothing.

Many letters of profuse thanks have been received by the church, its organizations, and individual members from the beneficiaries of this relief program. The fact that this help comes from Christians in a former enemy country seems especially to have made a deep impression.

League Receives Bell

The Walther League youth group has a lasting memento of its efforts in the form of a little call bell, fashioned of brass. It is the work of a 19-year-old sculptress and was sent to the league in appreciation of the help given her family.

The cost of this Christian faith in action program? No attempt has been made to keep a record of the amount of money expended. When asked for an estimate I have said, "I believe that \$2500 would be a very conservative guess for the three and a half years. But more important than the amount in money, is the fact that these have been gifts of love, freely given by our people."

Several Members Return 'Home' When Grange Buys Kelso School

When the Sandy Grange met for the first time last Saturday in special session in their newly acquired home, the former Kelso School, it was a homecoming in more ways than one for several members.

A number of grangers received their grade school education in the first log school at Kelso and in later buildings. Twenty-four grange members gathered around the dinner table to swap reminiscences of school days and to sing "School Days" and other old song favorites.

Grangers who had attended Kelso School in bygone days are Mrs. A. W. Bell, John Dunn, Robert Jonsrud, Joel Jarl, Ed Herz, Mrs. H. Perret and Mr. and Mrs. Fred Decker.

Teacher at Kelso

The writer, who started her career as a teacher at the age of 18, taught at Kelso School in 1901. Two present grangers were among her pupils, Mrs. A. W. Bell and John Dunn. During her youthful experiences she had one school with several pupils near her own age and some who were older.

At Kelso the writer had 42 pupils enrolled in a one-room school and taught all eight grades. The average attendance often was somewhat less than 42 as boys were many times kept at home to help with farm work.

Children seemed to have as much fun then as now, but more work was required of them at home.

Teased About Beau

This teacher had to uphold her dignity even when some of the older pupils teased her about "Robbie" Jonsrud when he came driving down the plank road from Sandy in his spanking new buggy with shining red wheels.

In those days the teacher did her own janitor work or hired some of the older girls for the job. Her salary was \$40 a month, the top price paid in Clackamas County then for teaching a country school. But board and room then cost only \$10 a month.

One could buy a handsome suit (the kind that trailed the ground) lined with rustling red taffeta silk throughout for only \$10 or \$12.

Social Center

Those were the days when the school house was the social center of the community, where church services were held, political orators held forth, debating and literary societies flourished and a basket social was an exciting event.

The preliminary meeting for forming a school district was held at the home of the late F. G. Jonsrud with Paul Dunn, Ole Pedersen and a few other pioneers forming a quorum. Date of the establishment of a school district at Kelso was March 31, 1879.

The first log school house was built in 1882 and called the "High Forest School," a name which clung for the 20 years the log building was used. In 1901 it was replaced with a frame building.

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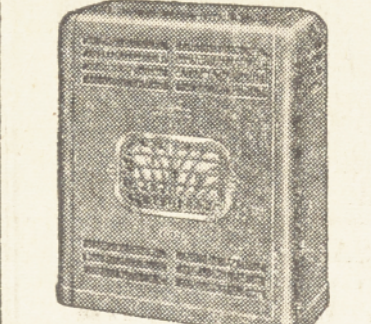
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At Pleasant Home—Father and Son Note Birthdays
