'Mikado' a Success; \$200 More Needed For Choir Robes

More than 300 people attended the Friday night presentation of the "Mikado" by the Sandy Union High School.

The musical was the biggest production of the school year and involved 65 people in a grand chorus and 12 leading characters. Costuming for the Gilbert and Sullivan operetta was the most elaborate attempted by the high school. Many of the costumes used during the performance were imported.

As a benefit, the presentation made money for the musicians groups involved in the musical. The group grossed \$141 during a special matinee Wednesday afternoon and the main event Friday night.

The house receipts for Friday's performance puts the chorus within \$200 of the amount needed to buy the new robes for the chorus.

New Vaccination Rules Announced For Poultrymen

State regulations regarding the control of Newcastle disease, the acute respiratory disease in chickens and turkeys, have now been revised to allow controlled vaccination, announces Noel Bennion, Oregon State College extension poultry specialist.

Poultrymen are warned, however, that both a permit and the vaccine must be obtained from the state department of agriculture. Vaccination is only recommended in those cases where birds have been exposed or where actual outbreaks of the disease have occurred.

Dr. E. M. Dickinson, O.S.C. poultry veterinarian, and Dr. C. F. Haynes, Salem, state veterinarian, believe an uncontrolled vaccination program would be dangerous. They, as advisors to the state poultry disease committee, point out that live vaccine is used. Newcastle vaccine has not been stabilized, and vaccination may result in some deaths, retarded growth in young birds, or a slump in lay for producing hens.

26 Cases Diagnosed
Mr. Bennion announces that 26

cases of Newcastle disease have now been diagnosed by the O.S.C. poultry disease laboratory headed by Dr. Dickinson. The first Oregon case of the disease was identified in January 1947. Only one of the cases was in turkeys.

The new state Newcastle regulation requires that vaccinated flocks must be quarantined three weeks following vaccination. In the case of actual outbreaks of the disease, the quarantine period is three months.

Poultry importations from out-of-state, Bennion declares, must be tested for Newcastle and accompanied with a health certificate. Day old chicks, poulters, and hatching eggs are exempt from this regulation.

Best time to vaccinate young birds is when they are between four and 12 weeks of age. For laying hens, vaccination is recommended during the summer months when production and flock size is at the year's low point.

Following a long period of cold weather farmers in the Sandy area now are interested in getting their pastures back in shape and as fast as possible so they can get their livestock out.

Frank Abbel stopped by the branch county farm agent's office in The Sandy Post last Wednesday to see what could be done about moss in one of his pastures. Frank said he had applied lime and phosphate, but the moss indicates that nitrogen would help that field.

Ammonium sulphate applied at the rate of 300 pounds per acre or ammonium nitrate at 200 pounds per acre should help clean out that moss as well as bring that grass and clover along in good shape.

George Jonsrud brought in some weed seed for identification. The weed seed came from oats he was to have planted. But before planting he very wisely wanted a check on that seed.

It looks like thistle of some sort, but we'll have to take it to Corvallis for positive identification.

When soil samples come in to be tested for lime and phosphate, the actual testing is expedited by having the samples dry.

Dry Soil Samples

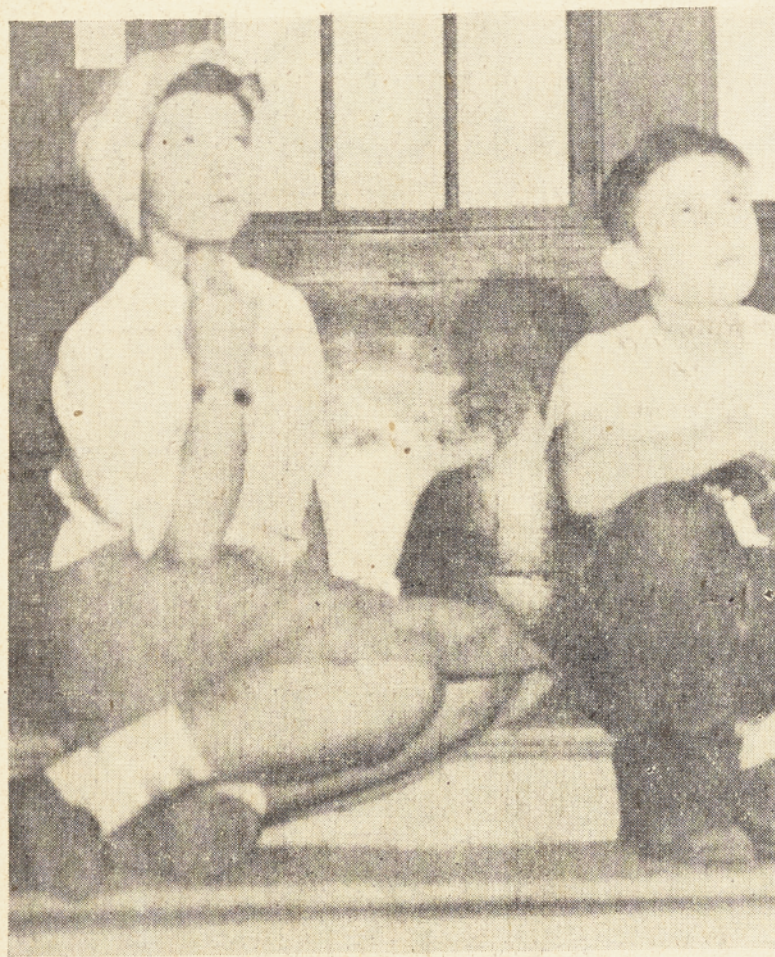

Growth of State Depends on Upped Power, Increased Farming Expansion

Continued business expansion

in Oregon depends upon two factors—new supplies of electrical power and steady growth of agriculture and lumbering.

This was the appraisal of the state's future as made this week by the bureau of research, University of Oregon's school of business administration. It was made in a survey of the employment opportunities that might exist in Oregon by 1960.

The study was undertaken to determine if the state's population would outstrip the number of jobs to be available. Estimates were based on average increases of both persons and jobs from 1940 to the present.

Increase 35 Per Cent

The state's population should be upped about 30 per cent by 1960 over what it is now. The increase in employment opportunities should keep slightly ahead of this growth, the survey concludes. Jobs should expand at a rate of about 35 per cent.

But the truth of these figures depends upon two points, the survey continues. Since farming and lumbering are the state's two basic industries, all other forms of employment are derived from them.

If the number of jobs in these fields fall off abnormally, other lines will suffer also.

The biggest single obstacle to business expansion, the study points out, is the disappearance of large blocks of low-cost electrical energy. If it is not soon eliminated, the estimated expansion cannot be realized.

Approximately 761,700 jobs should be available in 1960 if all goes according to schedule, the appraisal concludes.

US Army to Issue Medal Certificates

Winners of army decorations in World War II may now obtain diploma-type certificates from the department of the army attesting to the awards, the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs reported this week.

The army adjutant general's office informed the state veterans' agency that certificates are available for issue to recipients of the following decorations: The Congressional medal of honor, distinguished service medal, purple heart, commendation ribbon, distinguished service cross, silver star, legion of merit, distinguished flying cross, soldiers medal, bronze star and air medal.

Applications from honorably discharged veterans or from the next of kin in posthumous cases should be addressed to: Demobilized Personnel Records Branch, Dept. of Army, 4300 Goodfellow Boulevard, St. Louis, Missouri.

Those now on active duty or in reserve status should address requests direct to Dept. of Army, Adjutant General's Office, Washington 25, D. C.

Information to Be Sent

No application forms are used. Applicants must apply in writing, showing army serial number, date and headquarters of the general orders grating the decoration and if possible they should include copies of the general orders and complete citation.

No provision for issuing certificates for navy decorations has been made, according to a recent letter from the navy department on this question. While "under consideration" by the navy department, "it is doubtful if certificates are authorized that their issuance will be retroactive," the Department of Veterans' Affairs was informed.

GI War Policies To Be Converted

National Service Life Insurance policies are now being distributed by the Veterans Administration to Pacific Northwest veterans of World War II who have continued the insurance, the VA reports.

The new G. I. insurance policies replace temporary certificates the VA issued servicemen when they first took out the insurance. No action on the part of veterans is necessary to obtain the new policies.

Permanent Policies

Policies the veterans are now receiving contain a full statement of the provisions of N.S.L.I. contracts as established by law. They are being issued only on renewed term insurance or on insurance which veterans have converted to one of the permanent types now available. The original temporary certificates will remain in effect until each veteran has renewed or converted his insurance, the VA said.

The VA pointed out that the new G. I. insurance policies do not show the names of beneficiaries because these may be changed by the veteran at any time to suit his current desires or needs. Also, since information about beneficiaries is contained in the veteran's VA files instead of on the policy itself, the veteran does not need to return the policy when requesting beneficiary changes.

Veterans who have not brought their G. I. insurance beneficiary designation or method of settlement up-to-date should notify the VA in writing so their insurance files may be corrected.

Tooth Decay in Oregon Double that of Nation

Oregon school children suffer from up to twice the average amount of tooth decay as do children in many other parts of the country, according to a study being conducted by the school of home economics at Oregon State College, Corvallis.

Children in Oregon coast counties are much worse off in this respect than those in central Oregon counties.

The study was started about three years ago as a state project and now is a federal-state cooperative project as a part of a western regional study of rural health in relation to nutrition.

No explanation has been found yet as to why coast counties are the worst and central Oregon counties the best in respect to dental decay. Analyses of water supplies so far has failed to reveal significant differences either in flourine content or "hardness" as between the two areas.

KIWANIS INITIATES ONE

Over 40 members and guests of the Sandy Kiwanis International heard Herb Peterson, expediter for the Sandy Memorial Hospital, call for a talking campaign to put the hospital project on the minds of "every man woman and child in the area" Thursday night.

Peterson said he wanted people to think of the hospital all the time. He said the project is continuing to be on schedule and \$2,500 of donated labor has gone into the preliminary grading and building of the buildings needed for operation on the site.

During the Kiwanis meeting Charles Croston, Sandy High School teacher was initiated into the group.

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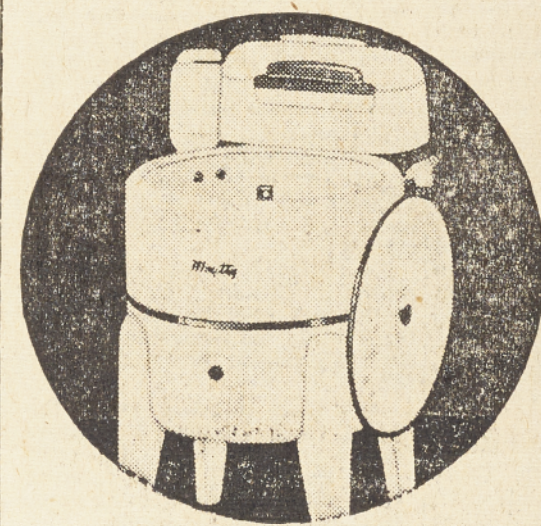
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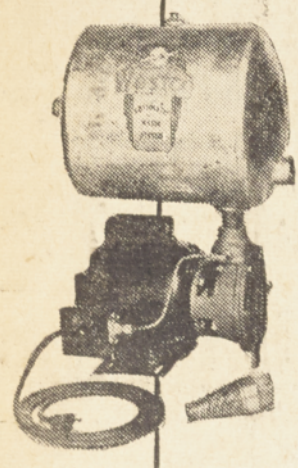
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
