Extension Advice Sought by Ten

Activities continued brisk during the weekly county extension day at Sandy with ten callers—each presenting a different problem.

Two soil samples were left for testing. Three called to talk over pasture problems. There were requests for spray schedules and inquiries on farm timber management, weed control, insect pest control, fruit tree planting, use of fertilizers, and greenhouse planting stock.

Callers Wednesday included Curtis Wheeler, Mr. and Mrs. Ted Wagner, H. W. Carson, George Van Bergen, Mrs. A. J. Bloom, all of Sandy; W. H. Tucker, Springfield; W. M. Pearson, Kelso; A. L. Conzler, Troutdale; and H. E. Stemler, Brightwood.

Legume Inoculation

Four bottles of legume inoculation were distributed. W. K. Crutcher, Orient, sent word that he has several hundred pounds of locally raised subterranean clover seed for sale. Both sub-clover and alta fescue seed are in short supply this spring.

H. E. Stimler brought in two samples of soil for identification. They proved to be of Toutle sand found in Clackamas county, mostly along the Sandy river.

Toutle sand does not rate very high as a farming soil, but when plentifully supplied with barnyard manure, limestone and phosphates, it grows excellent garden and berry crops. These recently formed sandy soils are naturally deficient in humus but are easily worked. Irrigation is beneficial to this soil.

Representing the P.M.A. office this week was Grady Bollinger, Hillcrest road. He talked over P.M.A. farm plans with callers and brought in live tansy ragwort plants for identification purposes. One plant was left at the office of The Sandy Post for convenience of callers during the week. Grady explained that many living near Sandy do not yet know how to identify this serious weed-pest.

One caller complained of an infestation of bulbous oat grass, commonly called nut grass. This one is more difficult to control than quack grass and it was suggested that no berries should be planted until this grass is completely eradicated.

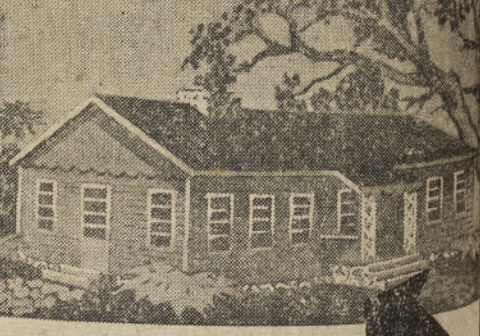
