tributed to schools will be \$813,322.71. Of this only \$360,870.14 can be raised on the tax base of the district under the 6 per cent limitation now in effect.

The tax levy of about 15 mills will be needed to raise the total, Mr. Woodworth said.

The rural district system "takes the money from where the valuation is, and puts it where the children are," Mr. Woodworth said.

Each school is given 60 cents on each daily membership of non-transported children and 70 cents on each transported child.

Balloting will begin at 8 p. m. April 18 in the following school houses in this area: Sandy Grade school, Bull Run, Cottrell, Welch, Boring, Eagle Creek, Dover, Damascus, Orient and Banton.

Sandy Wins Over Canby; Score: 2 to 0

Loses Sherwood Game; Sandy Junior Varsity Edges Molalla, 11-10

The Sandy High baseballers tipped into Canby last Friday afternoon, stayed for over three hours and marched homeward with a 2 to 0 win in the record book.

The Willamette Valley League game opened and stayed a deadlocked pitching battle between Sandy's rangy David Hopp and Ralph Smith for Canby.

Bill Rannow gave the winning runs to his Sandy team with some fancy bat-work early in the game and some even more fancy foot-work in the sixth inning when he stretched a walk into a Sandy score by stealing second, third and home base from under the noses of the Canby nine.

Hopp retired 8 Canby batters, walked two of them, and allowed two hits. Smith's record is not as pretty with his strike-out record of ten Sandy players balanced on the other side of the budget with five hits and two walks.

Sandy Lineup

The first inning saw a Sherwood batter come springing down the home stretch, jump over the home bag and stand still while Hopp tossed to catcher Rannow to retire the runner. In the sixth inning Sandy gave birth to a little rally and put one run on the scoring side of home base. Gifford came through in the seventh inning and cleared Sandy batters off second and third with a double, making Sandy's score three. Hopp then proceeded to knock a triple with all bases loaded which ended the ball game six to 11.

One Man Walked

In the seventh inning Jim Martin took Cawvey's place and walked one man. Cawvey struck out seven, walked three and allowed five hits. Sherwood's Lundy struck out ten, walked three and allowed nine hits.

Sandy made nine errors to Sherwood's two.

The junior varsity revengeed their big brothers Thursday April 7 by knocking over Molalla 11-10 on Orr Field. Troy Cawvey hurled for the Sandy team, and Bob Bentley pitched for Molalla.

Home Run by Cawvey

In the second inning, Cawvey knocked the ball over the fence for a home run but forgot home base on his swing around the circle and was put out on first. Cawvey's big one didn't count, but he did push in two players for the Sandy team.

Cawvey struck out five, walked two and allowed six hits. He was replaced in the sixth by Delbert Lee who walked five. Sherwood's Bentley struck out four, walked four and allowed two hits. He was replaced by Stundenger in the fourth inning. Stundenger allowed seven hits, walked one and struck out 2.

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No Cooperation in Flood Areas Says Army Engineer

Colonel O. E. Walsh, Portland district engineer, Saturday issued a statement charging almost half of the 58 drainage and diking districts in the lower Columbia river area with failure of cooperation in the face of possible high water this spring.

He said that his office had sent two notices early this year to supervisors of the districts, pointing out their obligations for proper maintenance and operation to make and keep the districts as safe from flooding as practicable, and that half of them had failed to acknowledge them.

Colonel Walsh invited the attention of the districts particularly to the need for removal of brush and trees from levee slopes so that the activities of burrowing animals may be observed and their runs destroyed.

Rural Trucks Busy

However, at the time of the blaze, both rural trucks from the Sandy station were busy, and equipment could not be dispatched to the Smith home immediately.

By the time firemen arrived, the flames were out of control, and the dwelling was completely consumed.

Many of the furnishings from the home were saved as the Grammer brothers aided Mrs. Smith in carrying valuables from the burning dwelling.

The housewife estimated the loss at \$7500.

Several neighbors had offered their home as temporary shelter for the Smith family.

At least 11 calls had been reported to the Sandy fire department Wednesday, and trucks and firemen were busy throughout the day.

First call came at 7 a.m., when a fire was started on the roof of a drying shed at Bittner's Plug Co. The blaze was soon controlled without damage, according to Chief Lyle Seaman.

Throughout the day reports of brush fire were received. Blazes were reported at the John Eggenmann place, on Jarl road near Kelso, near Cottrell road, on Bornsted and Gunderson roads, and in the Marmat area.
