Inskeep Gives Advice to Potato Growers at Sandy, Extension Day

Before leaving for Sandy last week (we were late in arriving) two potato growers from the Sandy area came into the office with a fertilizer problem typical of the area.

These growers had a soil analysis made, presumably by a reputable soil chemist for his findings are about what would be expected here.

The analysis showed low nitrogen, fair amounts of potash and absolutely no available phosphorus. The chemist noted a tendency of the soil to lock up phosphorus. We think probably some phosphorus is available, but, at any rate phosphorus is low and this is generally to be expected.

There are two points to be considered in connection with this problem.

Increase Phosphorus

Past practice has been to use a complete fertilizer high in potash and low in phosphorus which is getting the cart before the horse. This use is on the theory that potatoes use a lot of potash. So they do, but, they also use lots of phosphorus of which there is little available. We, therefore, recommended increasing the phosphorus content.

The second point is, that to be available, phosphorus must be correctly placed to give results. To mix phosphate with a soil of this kind would be disastrous for most of it would be locked up rapidly. But, if the phosphate is placed in bands at the side and below seed potato seed pieces, maximum results will be expected.

The growers referred to have a planter which makes correct placement so this portion of the problem is solved to begin with.

A 3-12-20 fertilizer has formerly been used. This amount provides per acre, 18 pounds of nitrogen, 72 of phosphate or phosphoric acid and 20 of potash.

Recommendations

We recommend for this year, 400 pounds of 11-48-0 anionium phosphate plus 200 pounds of either muriate of potash or sulphate of potash and 75 pounds of landplaster for addition sulphur.

This recommendation provides per acre, 44 pounds of nitrogen, 192 pounds of phosphoric acid and 120 pounds of potash.

We could add that a bountiful supply of organic matter is a primary consideration in growing potatoes and all other crops in the Sandy area. Furthermore, it is our belief that organic matter is better applied by planting to a legume and grass mixture or even straight grass, than by turning under annual cover crops.

We know, in warmer areas including the Columbia basin, that organic matter turned under in the spring, literally oxidizes or burns out the first summer. There is no reason to believe that such is not the case, to a more or less limited extent, here in Clackamas county. Summer soil temperatures are much lower where a crop is growing so that the burning-out process is retarded.

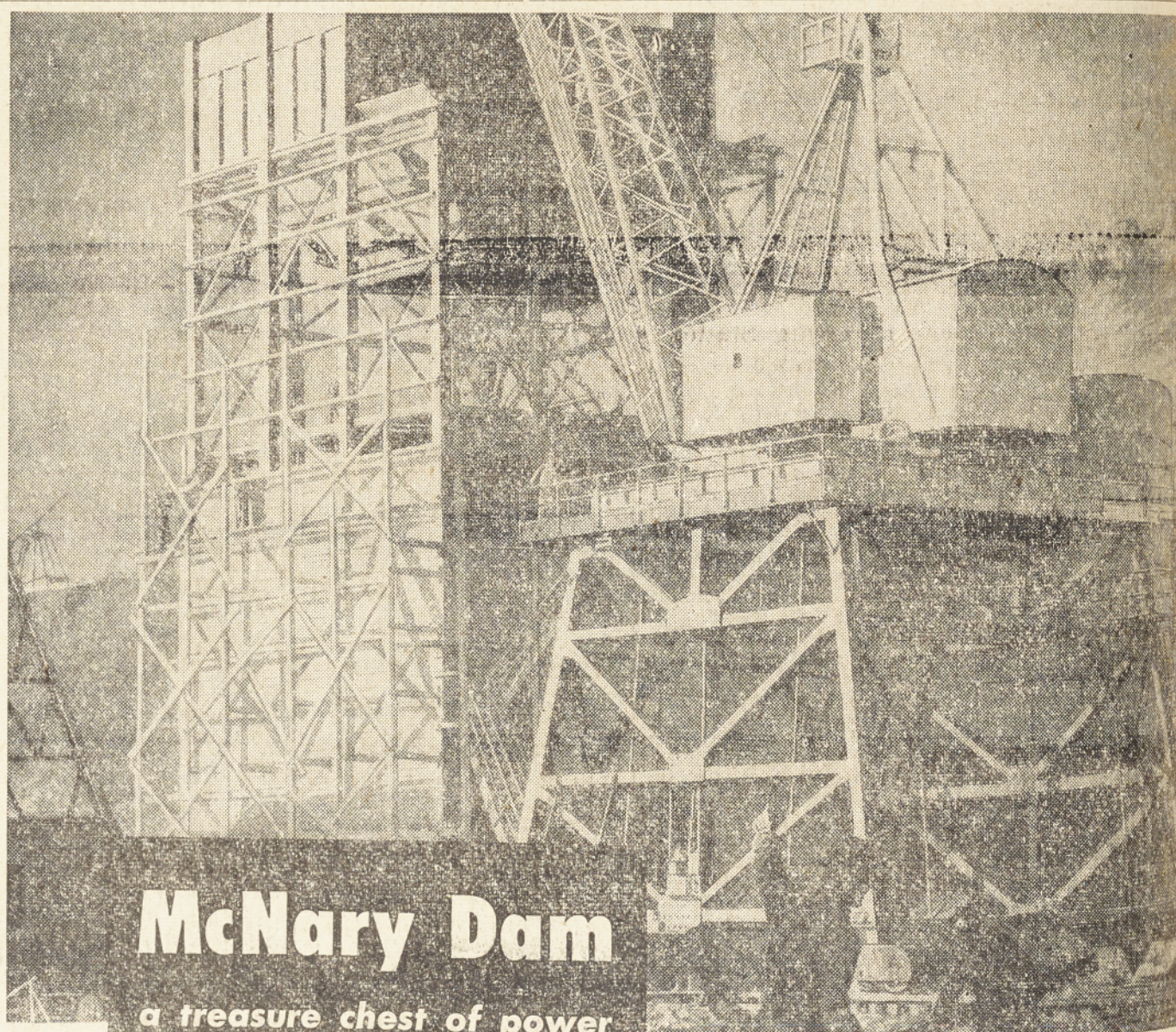

McNary Dam

a treasure chest of power

The winter of 1953-54 is the new date for the first power from McNary Dam, huge treasure chest of power, which will have an installed capacity almost twice that of Bonneville Dam. This is the first new major power source which will help to feed the power consuming Northwest. It is only part of a comprehensive program being undertaken by the government and your power companies to build new power projects to meet the electrical needs of this region.

Located on the Columbia River about 25 miles northwest of Pendleton, McNary Dam has been under construction since April, 1947. Initially (in 1954) it will supply 140,000 kilowatts and 840,000 more later, totaling 980,000 kilowatts—nearly twice the Bonneville output.

For the far future when more power is needed, the output may be increased by

still another 420,000 kilowatts by addition of extra units already provided for in the plan of construction for the dam.

Power will remain critical for a time

The Northwest was short of power last winter and conditions will continue critical for several years to come. Stepping-up completion of McNary Dam is one of the things the government is doing to speed its program for new power here. Portland General Electric Company and other members of the Northwest Power Pool are also doing their part to build new power sources and to use all available power to its best advantage.
