NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, in compliance with Sec. 111-908, O.C.L.A., to the legal voters of School District No. 2, U.H. of Clackamas County, State of Oregon, that the ANNUAL SCHOOL MEETING of said district will be held at the High School Building, to begin at the hour of 2:00 o'clock p. m. at daylight saving time on the 4th Monday of June, being the 27th day of June, A. Notice of School Election Upon Question of Increasing Tax Levy Over Amount Limited by Section 11, Article XI, State Constitution

(Summary of Section 11, Article XI, on reverse side)

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election will be held in School District No. 2, U.H. of Clackamas County, State of Oregon, from 2:00 P. M. to 7:30 P. M. at daylight saving time, at the High School Building in said school district, for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said district the question of increasing the tax levy for the fiscal year 1949-50 over the amount limited by section 11, article XI, of the Constitution of Oregon.

The reasons for increasing said levy are:

1. To provide funds for remodeling the lighting system in the old school building.
2. To provide sufficient funds to keep the District on a cash basis.
3. To provide a special fund for the purchase of band uniforms.
4. To provide funds for increased salaries of school employees.
5. To provide funds for the purchase of additional land for school purposes.

The amount of tax in excess of the 6% limitation, proposed to be levied for said fiscal year is \$44,153.94.
