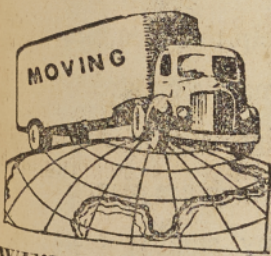

Bell Death Marks End of Sandy Era

An era ended last Thursday when Alfred Wilson Bell, 68, died suddenly at his home. A pioneer resident, Mr. Bell was born on his grandfather's farm at Eagle Creek, August 29, 1880, of Scottish parents.

As one of the early business men of Sandy, Mr. Bell operated the first stage line from Boring to Mt. Hood with teams of horses, later with automobiles.

He married Margaret Dunn on September 29, 1913 at Portland. In 1922, Mr. Bell began his lumber career, operating mills at Sandy, Wemme, Beaver Creek, Boring and Timber. He retired from business in 1946.

Mr. Bell was a member of the Sandy Odd Fellows for twenty-four years and an active member of the Sandy Grange for forty years.

He is survived by his widow; two children, Mrs. John Hillyard and Mrs. Claude Dove, Jr.; three grandchildren; a sister, Mrs. A. C. Thomas of Sandy; and two brothers, Albert Bell and William Bell, both of Boring.

Funeral services were held from Carroll's Funeral Home in Gresham Saturday, July 2, at 2 p. m.

Active pallbearers were: Thomas Scales, Rubin Hoffman, Walter Hoffman, John Harris, Fred Johnson, Orville Linn. Honorary pallbearers were: Del Jadin, Ed Herz, Robert Jarl, R. B. Mount, Frank Rehberg, Brenton Vedder, Alvy Lauderback, Clarence Stone and William Carroll. Interment was in Forest Lawn Cemetery at Gresham.

Spray Equipment Must Be Cleaned

Spray equipment used for application of 2, 4-D should be thoroughly cleaned before using for any other spray purpose. Clean equipment immediately after use!

It is practically impossible to remove 2, 4-D from wooden tanks and even with steel tanks separate hoses should be used. To clean the sprayer use a solution of household ammonia or a suspension of activated charcoal. First rinse the machine with clean water. Prepare a 1 per cent solution of household ammonia (2 teaspoonsful per quart of water); fill the sprayer. Leave the solution in the spray tanks, booms and hoses for 12 to 24 hours, then remove and rinse equipment with clean water.

If the charcoal is used it is much faster but more expensive. A 1 per cent suspension is used for a period of about 2 minutes followed by rinsing of clean water. Check for effectiveness of cleaning by spraying a few sensitive plants with just clean water that had been put into the sprayer. If the plant is not effected within a few days the equipment is safe for further use.

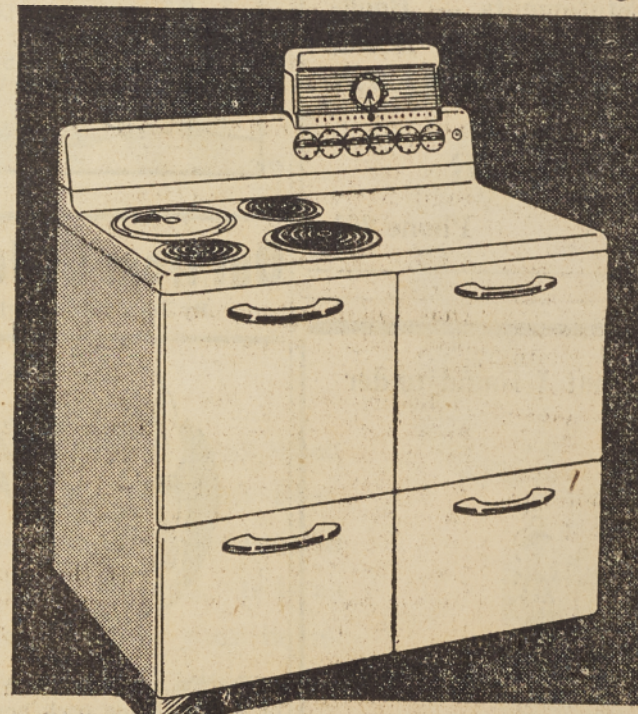
