Girl From Sandy High Studies Drama In Pasadena Playhouse Near Filmtown

Famed figures of the movies became down-to-earth people to students at the Pasadena Playhouse in Southern California, but the studious neophytes find little time to appreciate fully such pleasant surroundings.

Take it from Miss Aileen Koch, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter E. Koch Sr., of Sandy, who is attending the Pasadena Playhouse; it's a challenge to keep up on studies and also participate in plays and other school activities.

Absorbed in her work at the playhouse, Miss Koch thinks nothing of seeing Edward G. Robinson, Robert Ryan and other film notables walk in and out of her classrooms.

She started as a degree student at the Playhouse last fall and hopes to receive her bachelor's and master's degrees in theatre arts in 3 years. To do this Miss Koch must maintain a "B" average and be invited to return at the end of each semester.

Her freshman class has dropped in enrollment from 50 to 20 since the beginning of the school year and Miss Koch is the only woman still majoring in directing. The others have switched to acting majors because the work is "less heavy."

Upon returning to Pasadena after a vacation last week end at home, Miss Koch planned to begin work as stage manager for the August festival of plays by California authors.

A normal student schedule contains classes and rehearsals from 8:30 a. m. to 5:30 p. m. and either a performance or rehearsal in the evening. Study and sleep are sandwiched in whenever possible. Miss Koch was in rehearsals and plays on both the Fourth of July and Easter. Since enrolling, Miss Koch has seen over 150 plays.

The school has 4 stages designed for play types and periods. Miss Koch was fortunate to have several lines in main stage productions this spring. First year students are usually limited to class productions.

Miss Koch received her bachelor of arts (music) degree in voice from the University of Oregon in 1948. She doesn't have time to study voice now, but occasionally arranges scores or has a part which calls for her lyric soprano voice.

2,4,5-T Shows Good Results

The new hormone-type weed killer, 2,4,5-T, recommended for spraying blackberries, looks promising for other brushy plants. Willows, hazel, alder, poison oak and scotch broom have all been reported susceptible to 2,4,5-T.

However, some of these woody plants may possibly be controlled as efficiently with the cheaper ester form of 2,4-D. Too, adequate experimental work has not been observed to accurately determine the efficiency of 2,4,5-T on many plants.

Five pounds of the acid equivalent of 2,4,5-T in 100 gallons is recommended for general use. Sprays should be applied to thoroughly wet the foliage. For blackberry spraying, 3 pounds of acid equivalent per 100 gallons will probably be sufficient.

Labor Cost Can Offset High Dairy Production

High producing cows obtained at too great a cost in labor and purchased feeds will not insure high net income on a dairy farm, as shown again in results of a study of income and expenses on seven farms in Clatsop county that are cooperating under the farm unit test demonstrations of the Tennessee Valley authority. The study was made by staff members of the farm management department at O.S.C. experiment station.
