### GOVERNOR COMING TO SANDY—

Sandy will be host to Oregon's chief executive next Thursday evening, October 20th, when Gov. Douglas McKay will be the speaker at the annual dinner and meeting of the Mount Hood Pow-Wowers. It will be the first time Mr. McKay has visited Sandy in the official capacity of governor of Oregon and needless to say it is an event which is being looked forward to with keen anticipation in this community.

The event is an ideal one for a visit from our governor. It affords him an interesting picture of affairs and activities of the closely knit mountain area through reports of committees outlining accomplishments during the last year and forecasting at least a part of the projects under way and planned for the future.

At the same time, the Pow-Wowers annual meeting usually is one of the largest community gatherings of the year, drawing attendance from the top of the mountain down to Gresham and beyond. Thus a large audience well representative of the diversified interests of northeast Clackamas county and eastern Multnomah county will be on hand to hear the governor report on affairs of state and possibly discuss some of the problems of greatest public interest. It will also afford an opportunity for both the governor and local citizens to become better acquainted with each other and to exchange views on public matters.

Tickets for the event already are on sale and have been going rapidly. The Post recommends that those who wish to attend purchase their tickets at once since it will be necessary to limit attendance to the capacity of the dining facilities at The Fireside, where the event will be held.

### ABOUT "DO NOTHING" CONGRESSES—

Nine months have crept by since the 81st congress began its work in Washington, D.C. It was presented at the outset with a

second blueprint of a program pronounced by President Truman in Philadelphia a year ago last summer and for which he had previously called congress into a special session. It is the same program, with a few minor changes, which Mr. Truman brazenly declared that congress could write into legislation in 15 days.

That was when he was talking about a congress in which the republicans were in the majority. Later, Mr. Truman campaigned successfully for re-election largely by pointing a finger at the 80th congress, calling it a "do-nothing" congress and blaming the republicans for its failure to enact into law his pet program.

The present congress is firmly controlled by the president's own democratic party. Yet today, nine months after the 81st session was started, only two parts of the president's program have been put into effect. These are a housing bill and the minimum wage bill. The first was, in fact, a republican housing bill and the second was put through only after the republicans supplied sufficient votes to overcome opposition of southern democrats.

Today we don't hear a peep from the White House about the ease and speed with which the president's program could be adopted. Nor do we find much action to help put it across. The democratic 81st congress is truly showing up as a "do nothing" congress so far as the Truman program is concerned.

### IT'S SKI TIME AGAIN—

The first new fall snows have arrived on Mt. Hood and it's ski time again. The vanguard of the almost constant stream of traffic that will travel through Sandy up the slopes of Mt. Hood to enjoy this exhilarating sport started last week end.
