## Scarlet Fever Cases Are Found In County

Several cases of scarlet fever in Clackamas county have been reported to the Health Department, according to Dr. Mary Soules, County Health Officer. If your child has a sore throat and fever, he should have medical attention, Dr. Soules says.

Scarlet and septic sore throat are caused by germs of the streptococcus family. The child with a septic sore throat may spread these germs and cause another child to have scarlet fever. The rash in scarlet fever is an allergic manifestation to the toxins in the germs and does not occur in all persons ill with the disease.

Although scarlet fever is not as serious a disease as it was previously, untreated cases may still develop complications, Dr. Soules warns.

All scarlet fever cases must be isolated. The public health nurses are available to anyone who wishes help with isolation technique in the home.

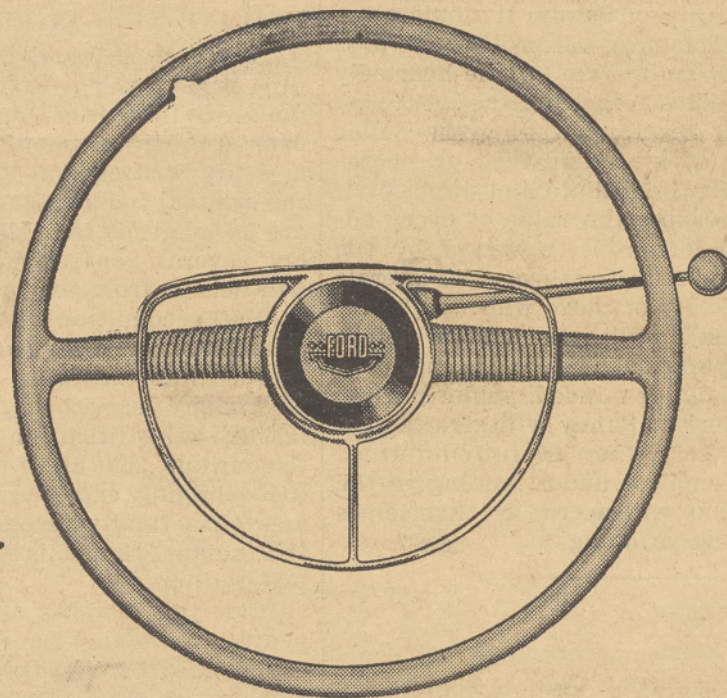

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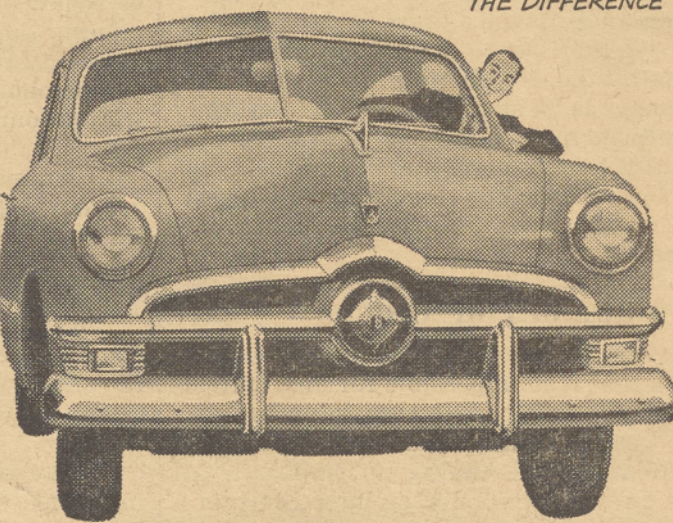
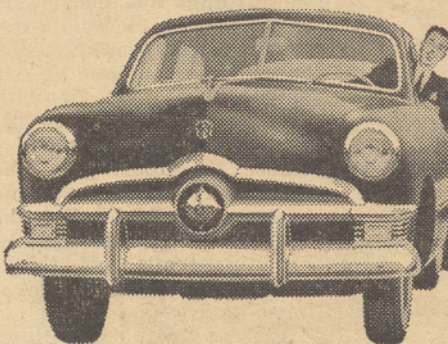
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
