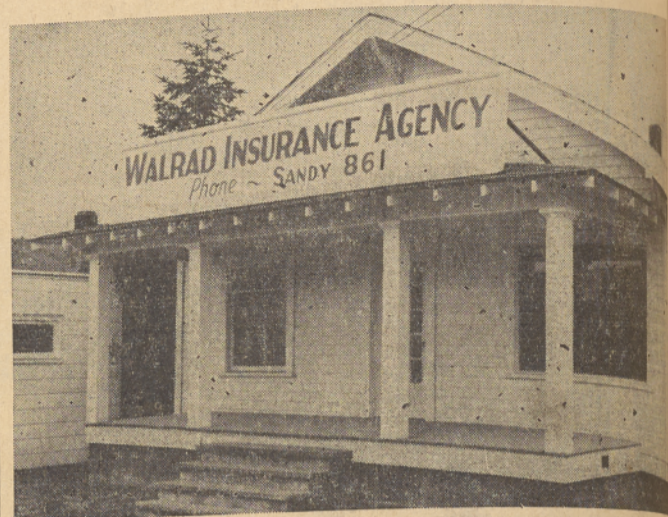

17 percent of the national fire loss is attributed to cigarettes.

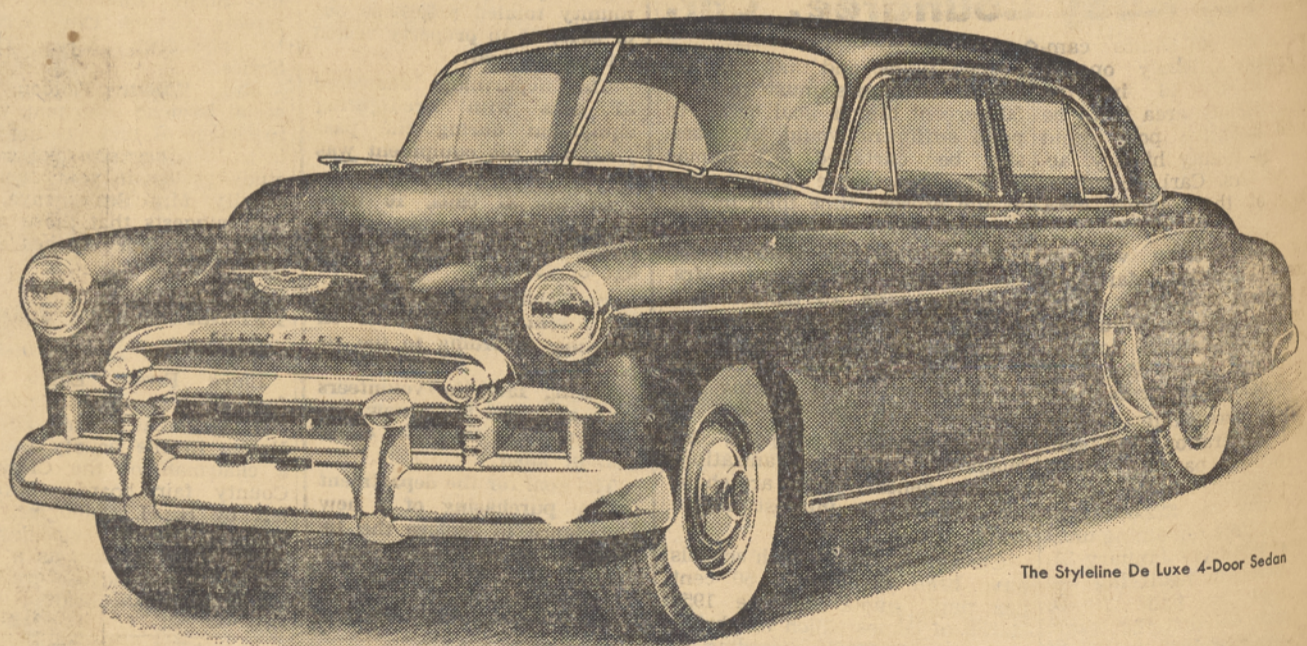
