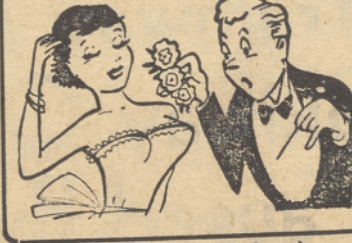
Dode Kopper has been seriously ill but is now able to be up and around again.

Sandy meal-builders, as well as women all over the nation, are beginning to be garlic-conscious. This sounds strange but nevertheless it's true.

American preparation of food has taken a decided change in the past 10 years. This is particularly evident when comparing recipes in recent cooking manuals with those of the past few years. The one large change is the use of seasonings. Especially garlic.

European countries have always been known to use a large amount of seasoning in preparing their meals, which accounts greatly for the methods that are creeping into American foods today.

There was a time when onions and garlic were shunned by anyone venturing out into public. These palatable seasonings were used only by those who intended to remain within their own four walls, and then only by a comparative few.

Today this is not true. Restaurant owners are no longer afraid to make a salad reeking with onions or fill the dinner roast full of the ever potent garlic.

As an example, one of my favorite eating places has been featuring a salad that to me was the ultimate. The flavor was unlike any I had ever experienced and try as I may I couldn't figure out the recipe for the dressing by the taste. My friends that accompanied me to this restaurant were just as thrilled with this dressing as I was. Last week I was invited out to dinner to this same place and after raving about the salads for so long, the owner broke down and gave me the recipe. All it amounted to was the traditional french dressing with ground garlic and American cheese added. The cheese takes away the sharp garlic taste but it's there and is it good!

Fried chicken is another delicacy which takes on an added goodness when sprinkled with garlic. Garlic salt is more effective on chicken and steak. An ordinary hamburger is elevated in flavor when onions are added, now try garlic—it's even better.

A fine main dish for an easy meal is meat-stuffed peppers. The recipe is simple: Remove top and seed of about eight green peppers, parboil about five minutes. Brown one chopped onion and one pound of ground beef in hot fat. Add four chopped tomatoes, one-and-a-half cups whole kernel corn, salt and pepper and two buttons of garlic crushed. Stuffed green peppers have always been good but only in the past few years has garlic been used to make a richer flavor.

There's no limit to how many ways garlic can be used in cooking. Soups, meats of all kinds, garlic bread, in mushroom sauce, baked potatoes, meat pie, stew. In fact, just take out your newest cook book and glance through it, compare it with one that was handed down from past generations and notice the difference. Garlic!

There's no getting around it, garlic has found its place in American society as well as the home.

This could be due partly to the belief that garlic is a stomach and blood tonic. My mom always told me that people in the European countries were never bothered with stomach ailments because they included a healthy share of garlic in their diet. There is some truth in that old saying so maybe the general public is looking more toward flavor and health than beauty and calories. Particularly the women!

Come to think of it, it's no doubt the woman's fault that this garlic change has come about. Now that it's being used in salads, the women can eat it too, so—no fuss when the man of the house wants garlic on his steak.
