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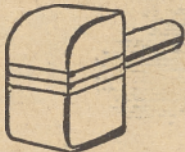

Sandy's aggressive attack took form soon after the hostilities began, as Wayne Fredrickson dumped one from the corner on the tip off followed by two quick buckets from Hershall Cansler. Gresham retaliated by dunking two long ones to make the score 8-4 in favor of Sandy, with only four minutes gone.

At the end of the first rough and tumble quarter, Sandy emerged on the big end of a 12-10 score.

With three minutes gone in the second quarter, Gresham forged into the lead on two quick baskets by McWilliams to make the score 17-15. The Pioneers, not to be outdone, came back to tie the score 17-17, only to trail again at the half by three points.

At the start of the second half Gresham added four points to their lead while Sandy lost part of their backboard strength when Bill Rannow fouled out. From that point on the blue clad Gophers never relinquished their lead.

Wayne Fredrickson, Sandy's veteran forward, regained his shooting eye, that up until last night had been a little rusty, by ticking the net for 16 points. Sandy's second high scorer was Hershall Cansler, who collected 5 points. Edison was high for Gresham with 14.

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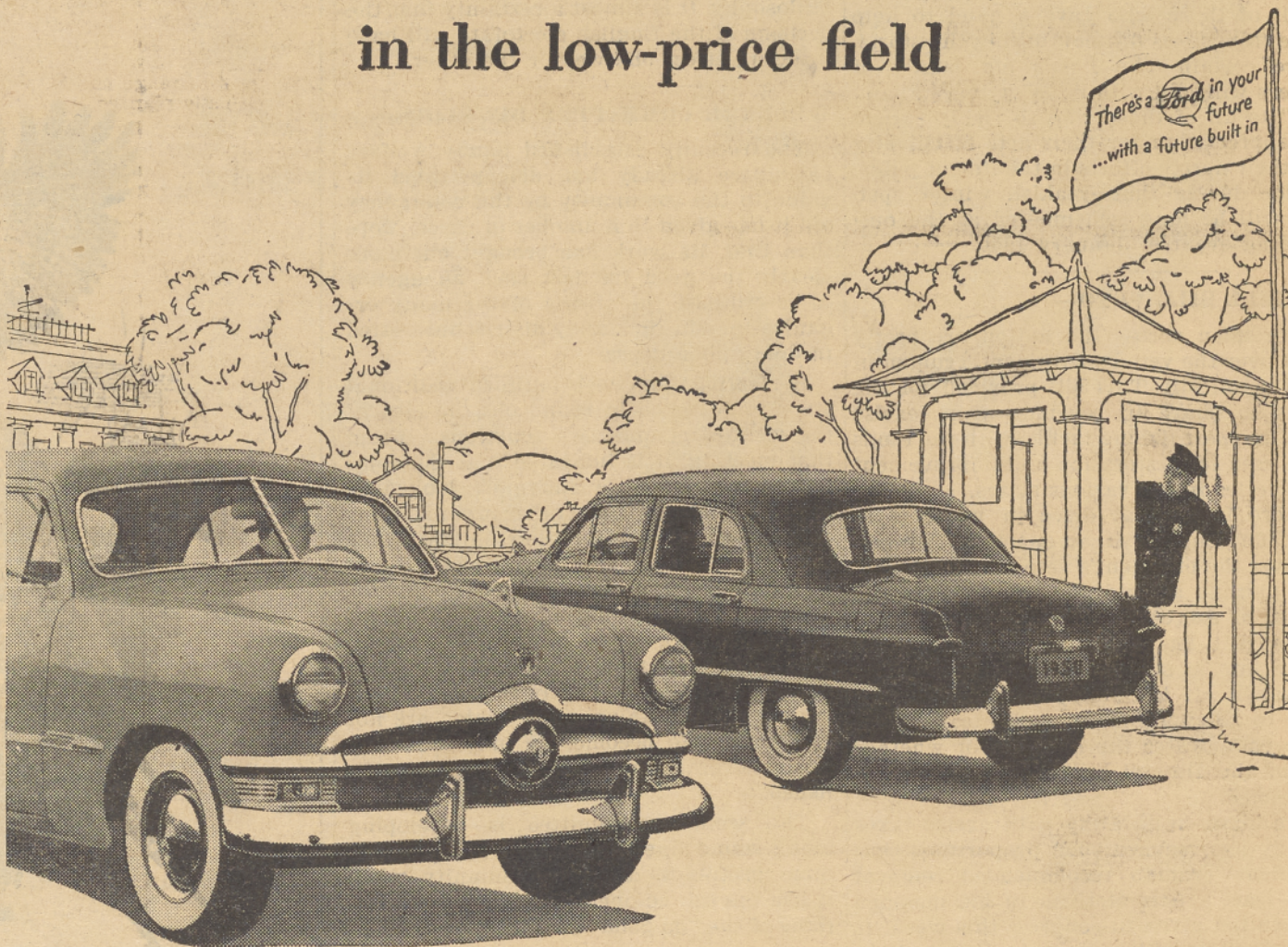
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
