The Sandy high FFA parliamentary team, competing in the state contest on the evening of March 23, at La Grande, came in a close second to the Malin FFA team.

The four teams in the state contest were the winners of district and interdistrict contests. The teams competing in the La Grande contest represented the best of 71 Chapter parliamentary teams. Placing third and fourth were Gervais and McLoughlin.

The Malin team placing first, received a large rotating plaque and a smaller permanent plaque from the state FFA association. This award was made by state President Bob Estoup the following evening.

Judging the contest, which was held in the auditorium of the Eastern Oregon College of Education, were the college president and two professors of the speech department.

Though the Sandy, Gervais and McLoughlin teams placed, they were not awarded with banners or plaques.

The winners of the scholarships will be announced near the last of May or the first of June.

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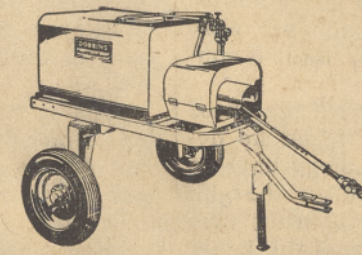
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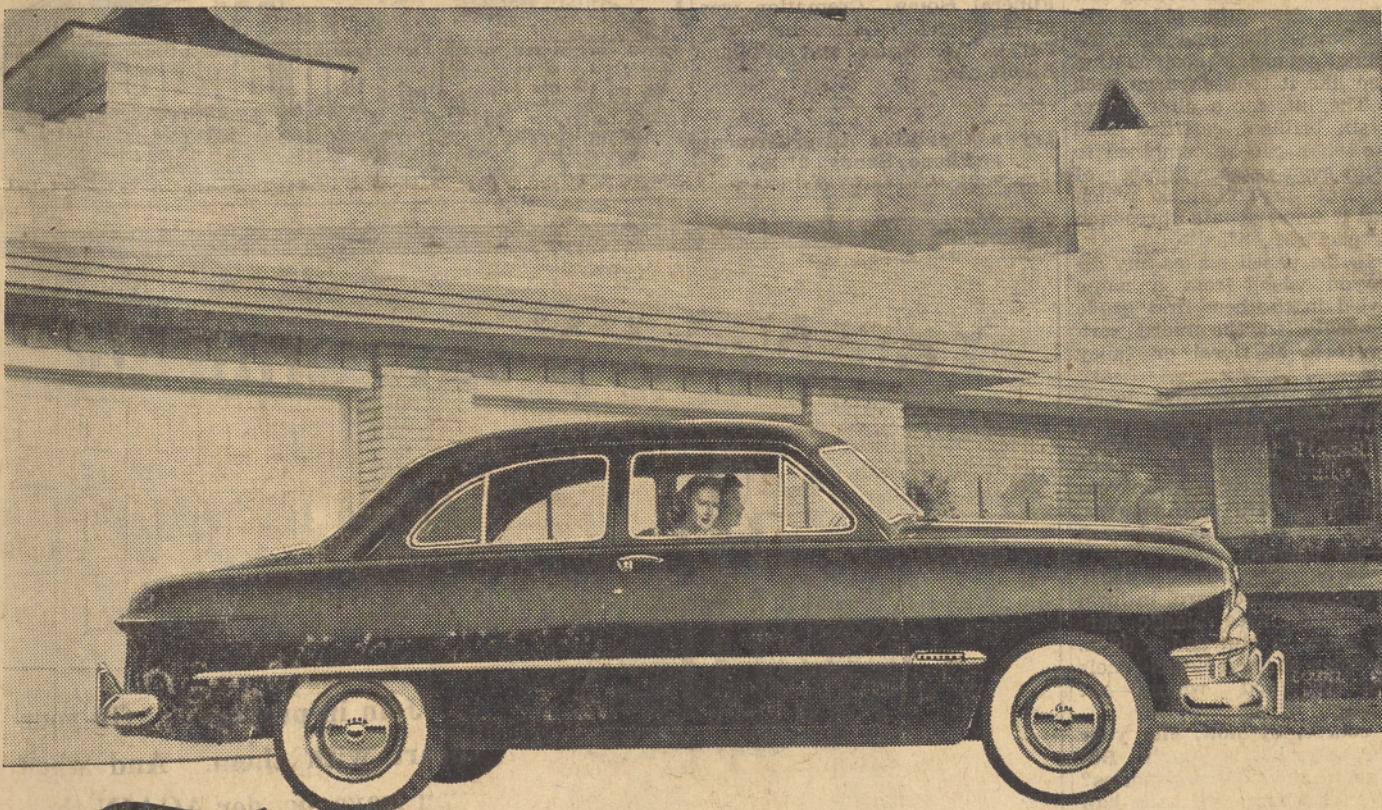
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
