Lady Of The Week—

AGED SANDY MUSICIAN HAS FAITH IN SELF

"Complete mental and physical
relaxation for a few minutes
each day is as important to long
life as keeping an active interest
in world affairs."

Mrs. Laura Crawford can be
called an expert in making this
statement. Eighty-seven on her
next birthday in November, Mrs.
Crawford has lived in Sandy
since the town had "only about
400 people."

Music Study Abroad
She learned to relax complete-
ly, Mrs. Crawford said, when
she studied music in Dresden,
Germany, during the last cen-
tury. The daily practice has
helped her, not only to rest, but
has saved her injury when she
failed to see the edge of that
pesky sidewalk or misjudged her
ability to balance the woodbox
when she goes to replenish the
stove in her tiny one room home
on Park avenue.

In her 87th year "Aunt Laura"
is still passionately interested
in the music which has been her
life. She was born in a now

forgotten western Oregon town
at the end of a long wagon trek
from Illinois in the late fall of
1863.

In a corner of her small home,
Mrs. Crawford keeps a shrine
holding pictures of the artists
she used to appear with in Eur-
ope and Oregon. Dresden china
and faded programs share space
with an antique crucifix and a
pair of votive lights.

"I've been an Episcopalian for
65 years," she says, "But one
thing I've learned is that every
church has something to offer
which no other has."

Self-Sufficiency Best
Independence and pride, ac-
cording to Mrs. Crawford, have
been both her greatest assets
and her besetting sins. On the
one hand they have kept her
able to withstand disappoint-
ments and heartbreak. On the
other they have prevented her
from obtaining aid from her old
friends, since she likes to "stand
on my own two feet."

Barely five feet tall, this slight
little lady can converse on any

topic from the latest news in
the music world to contempo-
rary literature and the future of
this atomic world. She reads
continually, thought she knows
it's bad for her eyes, keeping
posted through newspapers, mag-
azines and radio.

Even psychology, an obscure
European science when she was
in her 'teens, doesn't faze her
with its complicated words. She
boils it right down to her own
terms.

Practical Psychology
"A lot of the sickness today
is mental," she said. "In a
world like this one you can be
weighted down with worry. And
mental anguish is every bit as
serious as cancer or tuberculosis."

Her own answer to today's
problems, Mrs. Crawford said, is
"Mind Over Matter."

"Take a lesson from nature,"
she concluded. "Life springs up
again every April. And if you
find yourself thinking like an
old fogey, remember some fool-
ish thing you did, and laugh."

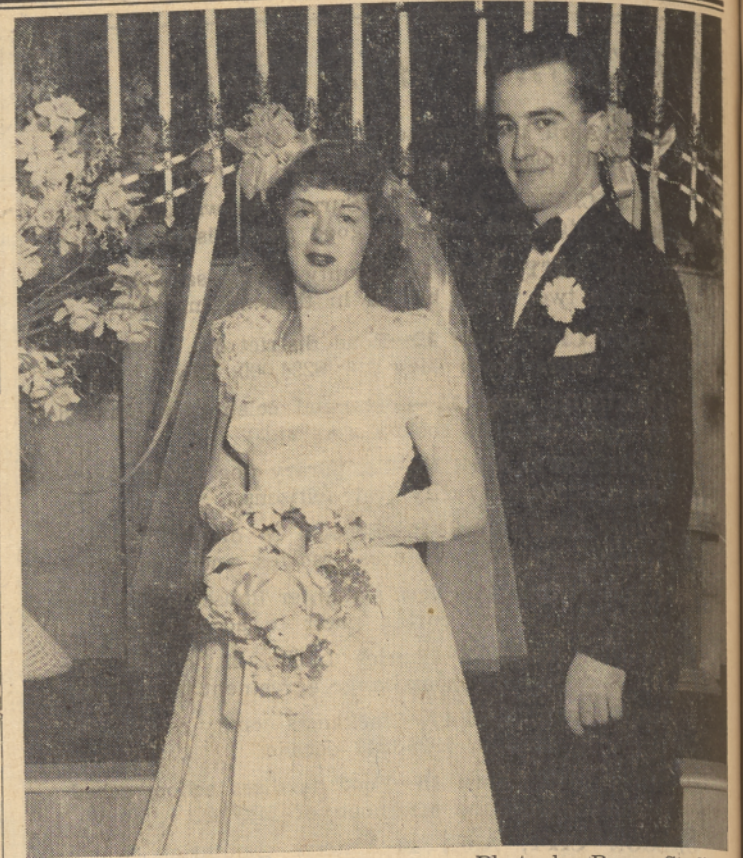
