Clothes, Tours And Dinners Are In Store For Festival's Princesses Before June 17

The five queen candidates for Sandy's 1950 Strawberry Festival got their first taste of the ceremony and excitement which will increase for them until it reaches the climax June 17 and 18. The princesses were honored with a dinner at the Fireside Tuesday evening, May 9, when members of the Strawberry Festival committee outlined festival plans.

Princesses Introduced

Chairman Bob Medley asked each sponsoring organization representative to introduce his candidate. Police Chief Walter Hosner introduced auburn-haired Diane Wolfe as candidate for the Sandy Police Department. Beverly Boylan, another red-head, was introduced by Frank Paluck, for the Sandy Fire Department.

Betty Lee James, blonde Pow Wower candidate, was presented by Mrs. Ivan Barker, and the second blonde candidate, Dolores Mills, was introduced by Kiwanis President Bob Duncan. Estacada Kiwanis candidate, brunette Hazel Graham, was presented by Mrs. O. H. Larsen.

Clothes, nearest and dearest to most teen-agers, were discussed by Mrs. Thomas Scales and Mrs. Ivan Barker, who informed the girls that the Festival committee would provide them with matching outfits.

Clambake May 13

Clothes were the main worry too, when the princesses learned from John Mills, that they would make a trip to the Long Beach, Washington, Clam Festival, this weekend, May 13 and 14. The girls will travel, with escorts and chaperones, to appear in the festival parade, the rodeo and the dance Saturday night.

Chairman Medley then outlined for the girls the program they will follow for the two days of the Strawberry Festival. On Saturday, June 17, dressed in their brand-new outfits, they will be guests of honor at the Strawberry luncheon. Then they'll hop into shiny new convertibles and speed to Gresham, maybe with a motorcycle escort and sirens, to present the wands for the Pony Express Race.

At the finish of the race, in Sandy, comes the moment of greatest suspense. Whichever girl has sold the most tickets will be crowned Queen of the 1950 Strawberry Festival. The Queen will receive a \$100 bond too, and each of the princesses will receive a \$25 bond.

Then the Queen and her court will ride in the parade and ap-

pear as the center of attraction at the Saturday evening show and the dance that evening.

Chairman Medley announced that the goal for the committee this year is the sale of 10,000 tickets which breaks down to about 2,000 for each princess. A program of events was listed as targets for good-will (and ticket-selling) tours for the candidates between now and June 17-18.

Tours To Take

May 21 the girls will go to the Milwaukie Pioneer Riders field meet and to the Molalla Riders meet on May 28. On June 4 they will attend the Clark County, Washington, field meet and on June 11 they'll go to Canby for the Territorial Riders rodeo. In between, they'll attend as many local functions as possible, always centers of attention, as Strawberry Princesses.

After seeing the five girls together, we think Sandy area people will have a hard time refusing them anything. Their excitement is contagious and with five such lovely visitors, citizens of other towns ought to feel compelled to visit Sandy at Festival time if only to see more pretty girls here.

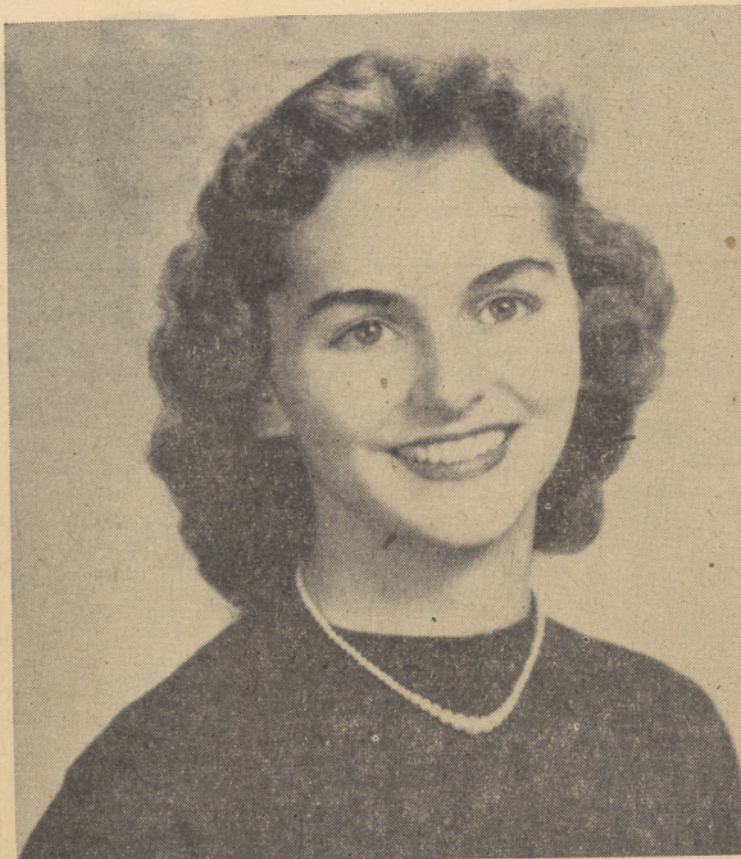
P.T.A. Bazaar Features Auction, Clowns, Food With Balloons For Kids

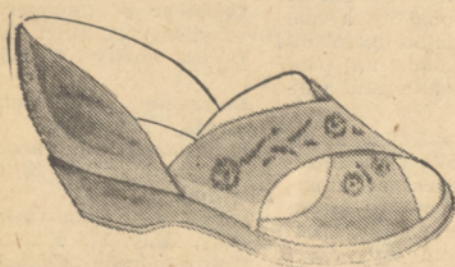
