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### County P.T.A. Council Hears State Of Oregon Schools At May 3 Meet

About 260,000 children are now enrolled in Oregon schools with about 11,000 teachers, reflecting the state's doubled population since 1930. Cecil Posey, executive secretary of the Oregon Educational association told these figures to members of the Clackamas County P.T.A. council Wednesday, May 3, at Park Place.

In spite of the tremendous increase, taxing school buildings and teaching facilities, Oregon's schools have the highest standard of educational program in the nation, Posey said. Within the next 10 years 500,000 children and 20,000 teachers are expected to be listed in public schools.

Dr. Stephen Epler, director of Vanport college, addressed P.T.A. members during the afternoon on the possibility of establishing colleges in all communities where young people live.
