FEDERAL AID—

American Association of Highway Officials is asking Congress for a larger grant for highway work throughout the United States. Constant effort is made to procure federal "grants" or federal "aid" for this and other types of work. No more deceitful procedure exists in our national economy.

The federal government has no money of its own. It cannot wave a magician's wand, mumble a few hocus words and create a supply of money. Wealth is created only by production. And the only money the

government has is our own money. Many times more money is sent to Washington from all the states than is sent back to them in "grants".

Only through taxation—income, excise, etc.—contributed by every wage earner, every business and corporation, every picture show, every purchase of handbags, gasoline, baby oils and countless other items, does Washington have any money to "grant" to the states.

Nor is any dollar that goes to Washington a full dollar when it gets back to Oregon. It is badly emaciated through the impact of administrative costs, red tape, padded payrolls. And when it does get back to Oregon it isn't spent as Oregon engineers and officials decide. It is spent when and where and as a Washington official decides. It may be that the only way we will raise money for necessary public works is by letting Washington tax us and then send us part of the take, but it is time that we stop thinking we are getting something for nothing just because Washington doles us out some of our own money.

It is much easier to be casual with money when it doesn't have any definite, known parentage.—W.H.

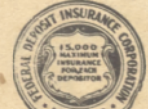
