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WHY THE TRAITORS?—

It is becoming evident that the expose of communists and communist sympathizers in high places, although necessary, is by no means the whole of the problem the nation must meet.

We are spending billions in countries of substandard living conditions on the theory that well-fed, happy people will be poor soil for communist doctrines. Yet the exposed and proven cases of spying, traitorous connections with Russia, and support of subversive movements here have not lain with the common people but with the well-fed, highly paid, "intellectuals."

To put the finger on definite causes of the diversion from Democracy of the Hiss', the Fuchs', the Wadleighs and others is difficult but several reasons seem clear.

First, the old feeling that the grass on the other side of the fence is greener. The lush patches of green across the fence are easily seen, but one does not see the weeds, the burrs, the pests hidden down at the roots. One gets accustomed to enjoying the fruits of his own premises until he takes them for granted, and soon the weeds, the burrs and the pests which he can see close at hand begin to dominate his thinking about his own living conditions.

Another reason is that America has failed to "sell" itself even to its own citizens. For years it has been almost a popular attitude among the Wallaces, the Tugwells and others to praise foreign nations and belittle America. Scarcely anything here has pleased them. Practically everything there, has. Another case of seeing the highlights of good some place else and ignoring the predominant bad, while reversing that attitude toward our own country. We have been remiss throughout our whole system, from grade school up through public contacts in all areas in not meeting this attitude. At times we have been almost ashamed to admit Americanism when we know that in all history there never has been anything so glorious for the individual citizen, as what America gives him.

Impatience is another factor in the problem. Progress on a world or even a national basis can not be an overnight procedure. Too rapid change is very apt to prove not progress at all. But some people, particularly intellectuals who believe they see Utopia in some radical change and who haven't the

patience to let orderly development accomplish wanted results, give allegiance to a system which promises, however spuriously, quicker results.

Salesmanship has made American industry but salesmanship of Americanism has fallen down. We need to be proud instead of apologetic for there is nothing yet found which approaches our system in exalting the individual, in giving him both freedom and substance unmatched anywhere, any place, any time.

If the spy exposes do nothing else but arouse the mass of Americans from their apathy and direct censure against democracy's detractors, they will have done a valuable service.—W.H.
