## DOWNRIGHT HUMILIATING!

The United States threw its immense resources of money and manpower and scientific knowhow and genius of production into the manufacture of the atom bomb, a destructive war agent more powerful than anything before imagined.

## THE LOYALTY OATH—

A lot of employees of the University of California have been discharged because they refused to sign an anti-communist oath which the regents have required of all persons employed there. The action has brought much adverse criticism particularly from administrators of other schools on the claim that such a stand stifles freedom of academic thought.

We believe the educators and others critical to have and express opinions however "left" they may be is one thing for an individual. It is an entirely different thing for a state employee, particularly a university instructor.

The United States is founded and its whole existence is conducted upon the theory of free democracy. Its schools are supported under that system and should be the educational bulwark against anything subversive to that theory.

Communism as a theory of society and government is in exact opposition to and its

purposes mean the destruction of the freedoms of democracy, the substitution of absolute control by the state.

Under our bill of rights with guarantee of freedom of speech, which must also include freedom of thought, it has always been held, and rightly so, that a person has the right to hold and express opinions even detrimental to the government so long as no overt action is taken.

But within the organized institutions of the nation there can be no divided loyalty. One of the chief responsibilities of the schools must be to strengthen the democracy which supports them. If that be so, then certainly they have the right to know if there are among the employees, faculty, administrators any who believe in or teach the overthrow of democracy.

We do not believe the dismissal of these employees abridges the right of free speech or thought guaranteed in the Constitution. Let these people if they have communist sympathies get out of the state service and express themselves. But they should not continue to accept democratic dollars while espousing subversive theories. There is something fundamentally wrong with a person who has a decided conviction on such matters and not the courage to admit it.

General Eisenhower, president of Columbia university, recently said in a speech "The job of a university is to turn out useful citizens . . . Every man, and woman who enters this university must leave it a better American or we have failed in our main purpose."

No school can be sure of effecting that purpose if it is not also sure that all its employees are loyal Americans. It can almost be counted on that a person who rebels at being asked about his loyalty is not very ardent in his support of our system of democracy.—W.H.

## "BALANCED PLAN" ON BALLOT—

The "balanced plan" for reapportionment of the Oregon legislature cleared a major hurdle last week when petitions bearing more than 35,000 signatures were filed with the secretary of state. The petitions call for placing the question of reapportionment on the "balanced plan" on the ballot in the November 1950 election.

Approval by the voters in November will force reapportionment of the legislature and thus bring about what earlier citizens planned as a regular readjustment of representation when they wrote such a provision into the Oregon constitution. Despite that provision, which required the legislature to reapportion representation after each federal census, there has been no reapportionment for 40 years.

The "balanced plan" not only provides the ways and means for bringing about reapportionment, but it also provides a pattern for doing so that is designed to retain a just balance between the populous urban areas and the sparsely populated rural areas of the state.

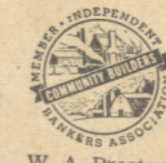
