Polio Strikes James Dove, On Holiday

James Dove, 16, Boring, was
discharged from Good Samaritan
hospital Wednesday, July 12,
after receiving treatments since
July 4 for poliomyelitis. James
was stricken over the holiday
weekend and was taken immedi-
ately to the hospital, where
quick treatment of the disease
was credited for his recovery.

According to Dr. Mary Soules,
county health officer, young
Dove's was a non-paralytic case,
but without quick detection it
might have become more serious.
He will be required to rest for
most of the summer.

Four other children in the
family and the parents, Mr. and
Mrs. C. E. Dove, were also im-
mediately examined. None were
found to have contracted polio.
The four children are: Nancy 18;
Shirley, 14; Donald Ray, 12 and
Janice Lee, 10.
