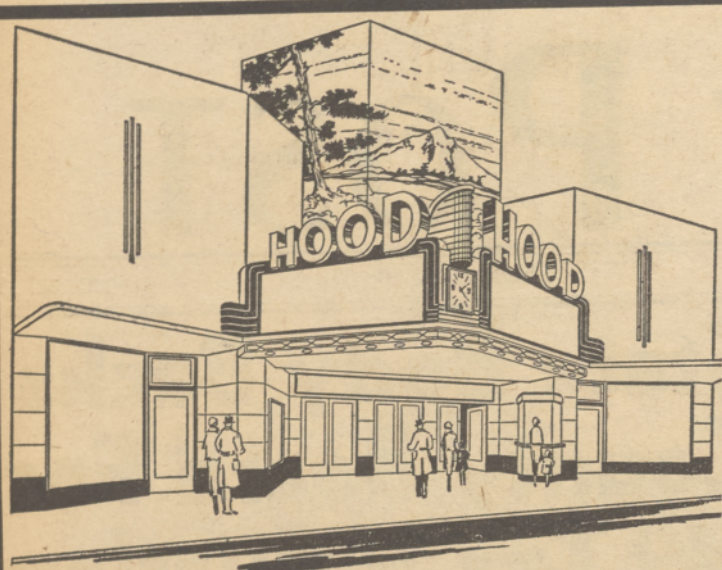

FIRST!

The care and feeding of small humans has made a complete cycle within the last 50 years. So said a heart-warming article in Life magazine, June 24. It was especially a bright light to those of us subjected to child psychiatry, progressive education, and the non-frustration of infant egos.

Most young parents, we in their mid-twenties and early thirties, have a strike against us concerning child-raising. We were born back in the twenties when the fad of scientific care of children began. Harking to hatchet-faced lady experts, most of whom had no children, our parents put us on strict "schedules," let us "cry it out," and believed that a child needed the barest minimum of cuddling.

It was supposed to toughen us up, prepare us for the rugged life we'd have to face in our adult years. You know what happened. We got tough alright. Our generation has the highest divorce rate of all time; juvenile delinquency has become so horrendous, that we are building prisons for children.

The most significant sign that we are darn sick of the clinical approach in our family life is that we are raising our own children entirely different. In fact, we've gone back to the way our grandparents did it.

This, as the Life article points out, is nobody's pipe dream. It is proved by the very book-writing doctors and psychologists whose predecessors started our parents out on the "let 'em be tough" school. It seems that those old fogies back in the gay nineties and early 1900's knew what they were doing after all.

Take the all-important job of infant feeding. In the twenties, when we were infants, the 4-hour schedule was god. If we got hungry every two hours, it was just too bad. Let 'em cry it out. Business is run on a schedule, let the babies learn the meaning of time.

But today, the demand schedule is endorsed and practised by nearly all mothers. If two-weeks old Junior gets hungry every hour on the hour he gets his rations then. The amazing thing is, after a month or so, he will adjust himself to approximately a four-hour shift. Now that's an early stage of self-regulation and it's all done without any screaming.

Then there's toilet training. In the twenties, when it was fashionable to have just one child and raise him "perfectly," a mother was humiliated if her child didn't sit on his potty at the age of 10 months. Some poor

little schmoes, when they could barely sit alone, were chained to their training chairs for hours on end. No wonder they grew up with neuroses.

Today most mothers wait until Junior figures it out for himself. They let him get familiar with the training chair, just taking it easy, and usually by the time he's 18 months or two years old, he's got the idea all by himself. You take your choice: Wash diapers for five months longer or struggle with a bewildered, enraged baby for five months.

The new idea, or the old one really, is: Love your kids and cuddle them when they want it; take it easy and quit stewing.

But along with this easy-going philosophy we also subscribe the old-fashioned spanking when the kids need it. It's dying a hard death, but complete free expression is on the way out. It seems we're hitting a happy medium—plenty of love but also plenty of friendly firmness. In our infant days, there was a screwy combination of fanatic training and absence of control in other behavior.

One more significant fact for the parents of this generation. We are having twice as many babies as they did in the twenties.
