Even Eggs Suffer During Hot Weather

Warm weather is a major factor in lowered egg quality with consequent reductions in returns to the producer. Poultrymen need not suffer any losses, says Don Coin Walrod, county extension agent, as egg quality can be maintained for a considerable length of time with the proper environment.

Eggs are a perishable product and deteriorate rapidly unless given proper care. Time, temperature and humidity are the three most important factors in maintaining the quality of an egg after it is laid.

During the summer months, eggs should be marketed at least twice a week to maintain a high degree of quality, advises Walrod.

While held on the farm and in transit to market, eggs need to be protected from high temperatures and low humidity. In order to preserve most of the original quality of freshly laid eggs, they should be kept at a temperature from 40 to 65 degrees with a relative humidity above 80 per cent.

When temperature is high and humidity low, egg deterioration is quite rapid. The thick albumen of the egg changes to a thin, watery albumen; any bacteria present multiply rapidly; passage of water from the albumen to the yolk takes place, and the egg shrinks in weight due to evaporation. Experimental results indicate high humidity is even more important than low temperatures in maintaining egg quality.

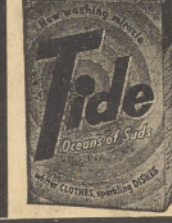
