HELP 'EM OR JAIL 'EM—

It's beginning to appear that the Truman administration has become so intent upon making life easy for everyone that it has decided to "help 'em, or jail 'em." At any rate the penalty provisions of the proposed Brannan farm plan are designed along these lines.

Senate bill S. 1971, which incorporates the Brannan farm plan, is the instrument by which the Truman administration would put such a program into effect. The bill contains a total of 86 pages, most of which is the complicated legalistic terminology which permits so much ambiguity that even the officers won't be able to explain it after the ink is cold.

The penalty provisions take up 15 pages of the document and, believe it or not, they include jail sentences for farmers who refuse to comply with the program. There you have it. So far as we have been able to learn, it is the first time in history—of this nation at least—that a bill proposed to help any part of the citizenry has carried the threat of jail for those who have the guts to believe they can do all right by themselves.

Farmers who have been duped into favoring the Brannan plan will do well to read the full text of this bill and learn for themselves whether or not the measure would be a help to them or simply one more step down the road to dictator government of the United States.

MORSE POINTED WAY OUT—

How the current conflict in Korea could have been avoided was pointed out in the United States senate just 5 years ago last month by Wayne L. Morse, junior senator from Oregon. Speaking on the newly created United Nations charter when it was up for ratification by the senate, Sen. Morse urged action then which would put into effect the famous Cairo pledge of independence to Korea.

The Oregon senator declared, "There is grave danger we shall miss our cue in this drama that is unfolding in the East. It looks very much as though we are going to resurrect two generals we buried long ago in the European war — Generals Too Little and Too Late. We are paying altogether too little attention to the urgencies of the Korean problem, and when we finally get around to studying it, we are liable to find that we are too late . . . If we continue simply to drift along waiting for events to take their course, we can be confident of what course they will take. If we abandon Korea, it can scarcely fail to drop like a ripe plum into Russia's lap. If, on the other hand, we speak up boldly now, place the seal of our approval and support on Korea's determination to be free, we shall be taking a positive step that will help Russia to get along with the rest of the world, for we shall be helping to assure that the Orient of the postwar years will be stable and will remain at peace."

Sen. Morse continued in that speech to urge immediate recognition of Korea as an independent nation. He repeatedly referred to Korea as a future storm center, unless it was recognized then as an independent nation.

The fact that Sen. Morse's plea fell on deaf ears is but another evidence of the failure of the present administration in the conduct of this nation's part in world affairs. At the same time, it illustrates why the serious students of government classify Wayne Morse as one of the great statesmen of the present times.
