The Sandy Post's Recipe Of The Week

Family picnics are fun and our Mt. Hood area offers outdoor eating spots unexcelled anywhere in the world. With summer on the wane, we should not waste a chance to have a picnic supper some evening, to soothe the papa's business-worn nerves and to delight the kids. If you're a bit weary, though, of the usual singed-or-drooped hot-dogs, here are a few outdoor cookery dishes which are easy, interesting and a delight to the palate.

Kabobs are tender cuts of beef or lamb cut into 1½ to 2 inch squares about one-half inch thick. These are run on a sharpened green stick alternately with bacon and onion slices, leaving a little space between for heat to penetrate.

Kabobs are roasted over coals. When the meat is almost done the kabob may be wrapped spirally with ¾ inch wide strips of biscuit dough. (For speedy, lazy variety of kabob, use canned meat or chopped ham cut into cubes instead of lamb or beef. Have the ingredients cut beforehand so assembly is fast.)

Fresh corn can be baked in husks. The silk is removed and cobs are tied. Then the corn is soaked in water for one-half hour and rolled in wet newspaper or foil. Corn requires about 45 minutes on top of coals to steam.

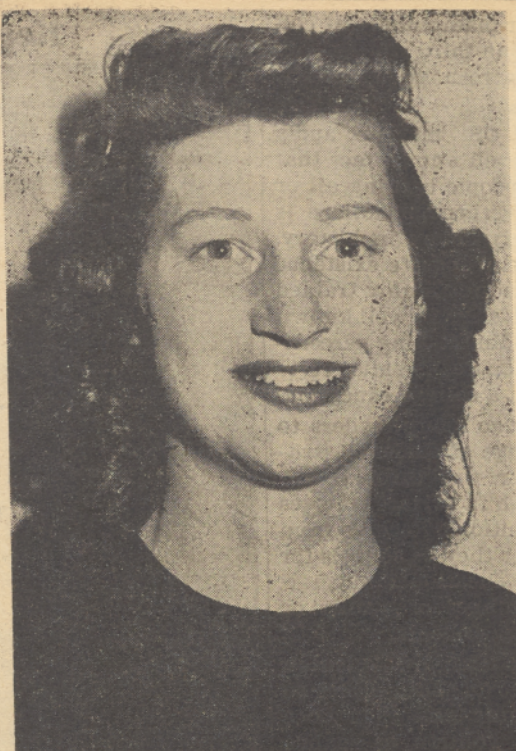

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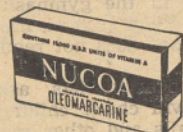
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
