Council Fears Suit As Martin Demand Is Made By Lawyer

The city fathers shivered with apprehension of a law suit Monday night when it was called into a special meeting to hear that Edgar L. Martin, one-time attorney for the city, had turned over a claim against the city for \$500 in fees to Alfred P. Kelley, Oregon City attorney, who made a formal demand of the council for the fees.

Mr. Martin was hired by the council last spring, on his proposal, that he be assigned to do the legal work involved in securing easements for the laying of Sandy's sewer system. The agreement at the time was to pay Mr. Martin \$500 of the requested \$1000 fee for the legal work, and to negotiate the remainder of the fee when the work was completed.

The city council authorized a payment of \$1.00 to open the negotiations after being billed by Mr. Martin.

Refusing to accept the \$1.00 check, Mr. Martin turned the case over to the Oregon City attorney, who wrote the following letter:

September 15, 1950
To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Sandy, Oregon.
Gentlemen:

I am attorney for Mr. Edgar L. Martin.

You employed Mr. Martin to perform services on proposed sewer easements. His services have been performed and terminated. The balance due Mr. Martin is five hundred dollars. Formal demand is hereby made upon you and each of you for the payment of five hundred dollars for said service.

Mayor Joe Yoerger appointed a committee to attempt to negotiate with Mr. Martin, or his attorney, to find out what kind of a settlement Mr. Martin would make.

On the committee were Frank Rehberg, Ronald Krebs, and Roy Rieck. The committee will report at the next meeting of the council.

Annual C. of C. Teachers Meet Slated Tuesday

Next Tuesday Sandy's teachers and businessmen will get together for the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet and salute to the teachers.

The dinner, scheduled to begin at 7 p.m. at The Fireside will be followed by a speech by John Taylor, who is the director of the special education for handicapped children in the state and works through the State Department of Education.

Mr. Taylor, who was originally scheduled to come to Sandy to speak before the grade school teachers at a teachers meeting, consented Monday to come a little earlier and take part in the Chamber of Commerce dinner.

Mr. Taylor has studied extensively in education for handicapped children. Sandy's role in the state-wide special education program will be Mr. Taylor's topic for the evening. Mr. Taylor is coming to Sandy to acquaint the teachers and citizens with the special education program—an activity which Sandy is taking a formal part for the first time this year.

Making the arrangements for the speaker is Mrs. Mildred Chase, a teacher brought to the Sandy grade school to aid handicapped or unusual children in their studies. Mrs. Chase, an authority on teaching other than the normal child, graduated from Oregon State college and took further training at Fresno State college and Southern Oregon college of education.

Excessive Speed Is Still Top Offense

The police report submitted to the city council at its regular monthly meeting showed that excessive speed on the highway is still the top item on the agenda of police worries.

The report also showed: The police drove 1906 miles on patrol and cited four for drunkenness; three for reckless driving; one burglary; two unlocked doors; 22 miscellaneous calls; six non-stops; five improper parking; seven defective equipment; and 32 excessive speed.

13 Leave For Army Friday

Thirteen of Clackamas county's men will be on their way to the army immediately, as the reports from the physical examination have been processed and returned to the county board. Five of the registrants are listed as delinquent because the board has been unable to contact. The names of the five have been turned over to the FBI for location.

The men, to be inducted this Friday, include Roger C. Palm and Phillip E. Sharer, Boring; Fred L. Ott, Canby; Hillard L. Creandell, Woodburn, and Raymond E. Day, Clackamas, and Victor J. Owens, Dale M. Kathrein and Floyd E. Raines, all of Oregon City and Leitmar Ksula, Forrest E. Gower, Gordon L. Bush and Richard E. Garber, all of Milwaukie.

The thirteen will only partly fill the county's quota of 16, but three of the registrants who have passed their physicals have been deferred for six months.

The five men who have been listed as delinquent are Russell O. Roper, formerly of Sandy, Dewaine J. Mingo, Carver; Willis W. Moore, formerly of Molalla, and Frank W. Cater, formerly of Estacada.

A second draft quota is expected for the county in October, but as yet there is no way of knowing how large the quota will be.

Sandy Schools Crowded As Late Enrollees Come In

The schools in Sandy are beginning to feel the pinch of additional students as the enrollment for the year leveled off this week.

Sandy Grade School registered student number 502 Monday—39 more than at the same time last year. If the trend continues the facilities for the Sandy Grade School and its annex at Sandy Ridge will be jammed to capacity. If the normal year-to-year increase that is expected comes next year, added classroom space will have to be built, Mr. Harvie, the principal of the school said.

Sandy High School is not in bad shape in building facilities, Charles Croston, principal said, but if the trend this year is indicative of the normal increase for next year, a larger staff will probably have to be hired. Sandy high school's enrollment is running currently about 20 students above that of last year at the same time.

The grade school officials who on the basis of a census taken last year expected to be well within the margin of efficiency recommended by primary school authorities, but an unexpected surge of registrants has surpassed the expected in most classes. For instance, Mr. Harvie said, the school board expected, on the basis of last year's school census that 52 students would register this fall in the first grade; 63 students registered.

In the second grade 60 pupils were expected and 70 have reg-

City Spending Below Receipts, Report Shows

Sandy's city government again showed a profit this month. The city collected \$1937.49 and paid out \$1701.30, according to the monthly report made by Recorder Frank Rehberg to the city council at its regular meeting the first of the month.

The city collected \$1262.49 from water rents and \$675 in the general fund of which \$385 was from the municipal court. The month before the city collected \$1475.58 from the water rents and \$403.50 into the general fund, making last month's receipts \$1879.08. Last month's expenditures were \$1734.56.

A breakdown of the city's expenditures included \$1051.30 for salaries of city officials and \$650 for supplies for the street, water and police departments.

Last month the city paid out \$1009.30 into city salaries and \$725 for supplies.

The city also spent \$1436.10 of the sewer fund, which went to the engineer, leaving a total of \$2427.28 in the sewer fund.

Voters Must Register Before October 7th

Those who wish to vote in the November election must register before October 7.

R. A. Dorman at 'Shorty's Corner' and Melvyn Skriveth of Mel and Genevieve's Pastime in Sandy were named this week by County Clerk Guy Pace as two additional registrars for voters of the Sandy District. These two men were named in addition to Fred Proctor at the Clackamas County Bank.

Registration is necessary for new residents who wish to vote in the city, county, or state elections.

Outside of Sandy, voters may register with Joe Vaeretti, Sandy; Bertha Alt, Cottrell; Edward F. Peterson, Wemme; Wooster Real Estate Agency, Estacada; Mable Wescott, Boring; and Erwin Sutton, Boring.

During recent weeks the Clackamas County voters' registration committee had noted that registration in the Sandy district was far short of Sandy's full voting strength and the new appointments were strongly recommended by Mr. Proctor to accommodate many new citizens in the vicinity who have been unable to register during banking hours.

Registration for the November election is open only until Saturday, October 7, and those who have not registered or who have moved since they last voted are urged to get on the voters' list now. Citizens of the United States who have been in Oregon since May 7, 1950 are eligible to register now. Young people whose 21st birthdays occur on or before Election Day (November 7) may also register now, even though they will not be 21 until after registration closes.

Roads To Be Part Of Rep. Campaign Sandy Meet Says

A plan proposed by L. Earl Wilson, Brightwood Grange master may become one of the main planks in the Republican campaign platform, when the Republicans fired the open gun last Monday at a Sandy meeting by appointing a three-man committee to study the county roads and suggest a "comprehensive plan" for road improvement in the county.

The plan, which was originally proposed at a June meeting of the Republican central committee was rejected by the committee, but at the Sandy meeting of the committee, held in the Woman's Club last Monday night, "The Brightwood Plan" was adopted and an investigating committee appointed.

Yoerger Asks C of C Aid On Sewer Project

Turning to the Chamber of Commerce in an appeal for aid to the council in expediting the long-pending Sandy sewer system, Mayor Joe Yoerger, asked a three-man committee to sit with the council in the discussions of the sewer system.

Mr. Yoerger said he felt the business people should take an active interest in the sewer, and should be an advisory force to help get the preliminary work done on the sewer project.

Appointed by the president of the Chamber of Commerce, Don Page, to serve on the committee to act with the council are John Mills, Jess Hite, and Mike Paluck.

Mr. Yoerger said the council had already prolonged the work on the sewer, and that, "even though they are all trying to do their best" that the Chamber of Commerce could be a lot of help to the council.

Water Shed Buy To Go On Ballot For City Vote

The city council considered and proposed that the purchasing of a water site near Sandy's spring be placed on the ballot for the November election.

The subject was opened by Ronald Krebs who said that Harry Orr, the owner of 15 acres and a spring near the spring from which Sandy now gets her water supply had offered to sell to the city the property needed for a water shed and a spring for Sandy's use for \$3500.

The city council agreed that there was no real need at this time for additional water supply, but said that at some time the city would need the water.

Dick Maroney proposed that the proposition be put on the ballot for the November election. The motion was seconded by Roy Hickey, and the council approved it unanimously.

Softball League To Hold Meet October 3

The season-end general meeting of the Mt. Hood Softball league will be held Tuesday, October 3, at the Sandy City Hall at 7:30, according to board member Carl Bell.

During the meeting awards will be made to the winning teams of last summer, and the officers for the following year will be picked.

The softball league, which was organized last spring, was very successful during the first season. Seven teams were in the league—four from Sandy and one from Bull Run, Boring, and The Mountain area.

Team managers and board members are expected to be at the October 3 meeting.

Freedom Scrolls Wait In Sandy For Citizen Signers

Scrolls for the Crusade for Freedom are at all Sandy business houses, according to Jim Kohlen, chairman for the Sandy area. The scrolls, which are to be signed by everyone, will be compiled next month and enshrined in Berlin as an indication of American faith in freedom.

The idea, conceived a year ago, and opened as a drive by General Dwight Eisenhower two weeks ago, is an attempt to combat through private sources com-

munist propaganda in Europe.

The objects and goals of the Crusade for Freedom campaign now going on nationally include: (1) to maintain and stimulate a daily radio blast to iron-curtain countries in Europe explaining the concepts of freedom and to combat the communist propaganda line; (2) to provide a haven for exiled leaders of the iron curtain countries; and (3) sponsor a giant petition to counteract the communist sponsored Stockholm "peace petition."

The members present at the executive committee meeting named L. Earl Wilson, Brightwood; Joe Stansky, Milwaukie, and George Durant, Molalla, on the investigating committee to study the county's road problem.
