Strawberry Festival To Begin Saturday

H. S. District To Vote Monday On 6 Percent Limitation

Levy This Year Is \$4,524.01 Less Than Last Year; Two Board Nominees Unopposed

Voters of Union High School District No. 3 will go to the polls next Monday, June 25th to pass on exceeding the 6% limitation by \$29,859.03. As this amount is \$4,524.01 less than last year, voters will get a break on a reduced levy this year.

The polls will be open from 2 p.m. until 7 p.m. at the Union High School building in Sandy.

Brenton Vedder, clerk of the high school board, reported that district 2 was in excellent condition and buildings are now being put in good condition for the opening of school in September.

The departure of Maurice D. Light and Richard Mudrow from the Sandy area left two vacancies to be filled. Marvin H. Light of district 107, Cottrell, has been nominated to fill the four year term, and Walter H. Markham, District 44-Jt., Boring, has been nominated to fill the five year term. Both are unopposed for election.

Grashorn, Koch Attend International Kiwanis Convention This Week

Officers of the Kiwanis club of Sandy announced last week the names of delegates who will represent the club at the 36th annual convention of Kiwanis International, June 17-21, in St. Louis. They are Dr. William Grashorn and Walter E. Koch.

These delegates are among the anticipated 10,000 Kiwanians and their families who will meet to elect international officers for the coming year, and to participate in panel conferences on various activities sponsored by Kiwanis, among which are youth, community and citizenship services.

Duane S. Knapp, president of the local club, said many internationally eminent speakers will address the convention. All addresses will be based on the organization's nine objectives of this year as well as Kiwanis International's 1951 administrative theme, "Freedom is NOT Free."

The Rev. Terence J. Finlay, a distinguished clergyman and civic leader of Ottawa, Canada, will speak at the "Convention Prelude" Sunday evening, June 17.

Mobile Bank Behind In Quota For This Month

The mobile bloodbank will be at the Sandy grade school cafeteria at 11 a.m. on Tuesday, June 26th, ready to go to work.

Mrs. P. L. Rogan, chairman of the Mountain area, announces that 70 volunteers from her area have signed pledge cards and will be brought in by caravan.

Mrs. Scudeler of Oregon City, chairman of the home service department, will be in Sandy, and the Oregon City radio station will announce the bloodmobile's being here, according to Mrs. George Hartwig, chairman of the Sandy area.

The quota for June is 7000 pints of blood, and thus far only 2000 pints have been taken in.

The Korean issue has made the call for a great deal more blood necessary.

Anyone wishing to donate more blood in memory of casualties or friends in the service may do so. Clubs are being encouraged to donate in a group if possible.

Mrs. Hartwig has stressed that everyone should do his part in the drive for blood, because no one knows when he or she will be in need of help of this type. Sandy has drawn on the blood bank on numerous occasions.

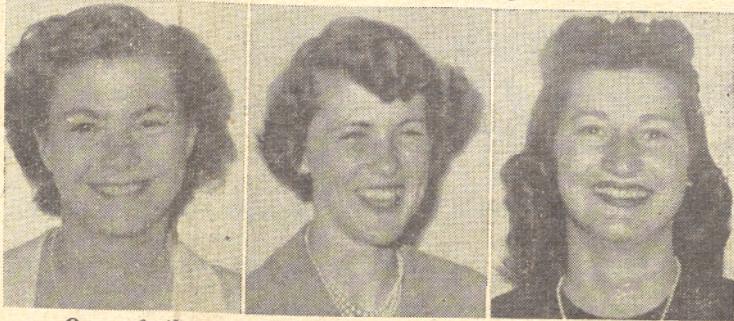

One of the three girls whose sketches follow will be crowned with a beautiful ceremony to

Donna Langdon, 17 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Langdon, Zigzag, graduated from Welches grade school and is a senior at Sandy high. She is the petite domestic type, a member of Girl's League and G.A.A., of which she was vice president last year, and a two year member of the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

She was on the inter-mural championship volleyball team, and played inter-class badminton.

This is the first contest of any kind Donna has ever competed in, but she is taking it quite calmly, as is suitable to her general quiet manner.

Two-year-term, Ruben Hoffman, 73; Lloyd Holt, 2; Edna Scales, 1.

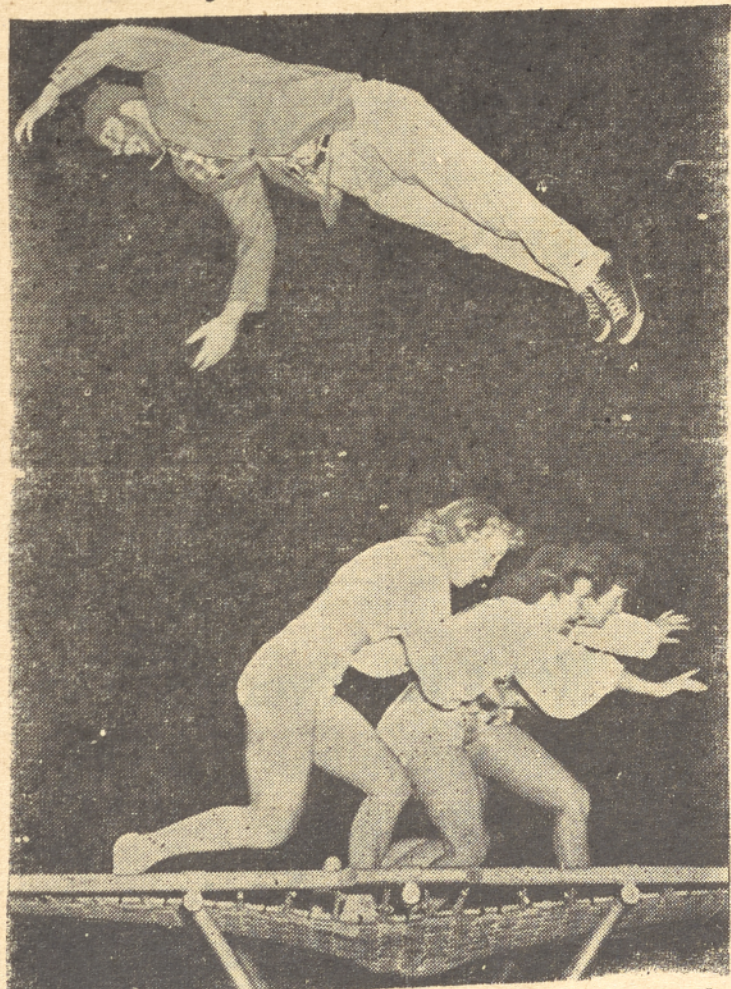
Square Dance Festival, Amateur Rodeo, Make Up July 4th Celebration

Big Stadium Show Expected To Draw Record Attendance

Kickoff Breakfast Starts The Big Day; Secretary Of State Newbry To Be Here

Round one of the big annual Sandy Strawberry Festival will open with the Kickoff Breakfast at Sandy grade school cafeteria this Saturday morning at 7 o'clock with Johnny Carpenter on hand to help open the eyes of any belated risers.

If Johnny's glib tongue fails to rouse the sleepyheads, the three beautiful members of the Royal Court will serve as finishing touches to the eye-opener. One of the three—Beverly Knox, Donna Langdon, Georgia Brown—will be announced at the breakfast as Queen of the Third Annual Strawberry Festival.

The Screwball Handicap golf tournament will be, nominally, open from dawn to 12:30 for the benefit of light sleepers who just

hate the thought of staying in bed once they can see out the window. Mt. Hood Golf Club manager Gene Bowman promises to be on hand to handle any early arrivals regardless of the hour.

At 11:30 a.m. a caravan will form on Main street near Scale's Dry Goods store to escort the queen and members of the Royal Court to the Queen's Luncheon at Mt. Hood Golf club. The buffet luncheon, in honor of the Queen and Royal Court, will get underway at 12:30. The public is not only cordially invited but urged to be there.

Pomp and ceremony will take over at 2 o'clock that afternoon when the coronation ceremonies

are held at Sandy high school stadium with Coronation Officer Ed Martin on hand, and Johnny Carpenter emceeing his second round for the day. At that time the Queen of the festival will receive her crown.

Secretary of State Earl Newbry and Representative J. S. Greenwood will be members of the coronation party and will also be on hand for the Queen's luncheon earlier.

Ernie Harris, parade director, emphasized that there will be no entry charge for any entry in the parade and urged all entries and prospective entries to put on the finishing touches in time to be on hand for the colorful start of the street parade at 3 p.m. Harris asked that as many riders as possible enter the parade.

After appetites have been sharpened by the early afternoon activities, a super strawberry and barbecue feed will be served on the Loop highway near the Trail cafe. Use your Strawberry Festival buttons for this. Barbecue Chairman Ivan Barker promises that the berries will be the juiciest and the beef the tenderest since the Festival was started three years ago. And Ivan should know because he's been slinging the bull long before the festival was ever thought of.

To top off the day's festivities will be the mammoth show that evening at 7:30 p.m. at the Sandy high school stadium. Bob Perkins, one of the top master of ceremonies in the country, will mc the occasion and take part in what is sure to be the most spectacular action packed show that has ever hit Sandy. Among the evenings' glittering acts will be those of a magician, a unicycle, a trampoline act, a professional chorus of 40 beautiful voices, quartet numbers, and a featured record act by Bob Perkins himself.

The Lane Trio (an action picture of their act appears elsewhere in this issue) will put on their thrilling trampoline performance with Homer the Clown accounting for a good share of the evening's laughs, and Chandler The Magician will mystify and entertain with what has been described as The Unique among magicians.

Bob Medley, general chairman of the festival, promises that the show will be worth four times the 50 cents charged and predicts that it will set an all-time high for spectacular entertainment in this area.

Queen Of Rodeo Is Karama Rice

Mammoth Show Featured Act Is Fastest Magician

The featured act of the Strawberry Festival mammoth show Saturday night, June 23, will be Chandler The Magician, the demon demonstrator of deceptive dexterity, who is rated as one of the fastest magicians on the American stage today. In portions of his program he produces deceptions at the remarkable rate of 13 a minute.

Chandler is the president of the Pacific Coast Association of Magicians which is composed of some 2200 magicians from Canada to Mexico.

Among the illusions which Chandler will present are such mysteries as the headless boy, the capering coins, the human sewing machine, the million dollar mystery, and the vanishing parasol.
