**Ground Detection Test Scheduled June 23, 24**

A nationwide training exercise to test ground detection of aircraft will be in operation for a 32 hour period June 23 and 24. Col. C. D. Vincent, commanding officer of the 25th Air Division at Everett, announced Saturday.

Oregon will have 200 ground observation posts during the test, which will begin at 8 a.m. June 23 and conclude at 4 p.m. June 24. Portland will be the seat of the filter centers.

Air force officials point to the importance of the ground observer in aircraft detection to cover the blind spots in the radar system, which does not follow the earth's curvature and cannot penetrate mountains and other opaque masses.
