The Triune Godhead

First, let us define the subject proposed. "Triune" means three united. Tri meaning three, and -une meaning united. So we see the Godhead then as three united. Godhead is sometimes expressed as Godhood, which means the family of God. So the Godhead is three united spiritual beings. They are God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit. Jesus spoke of the three in the same scripture in John 14:26, when he said, "But the Comforter, even the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name . . ."

using the pronoun "whom," which refers to a personality. The three are also used in Matthew 28:19 when Jesus said, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations baptizing them into the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." The plurality of the Godhead is first expressed by God the Father before the creation of man, when he said, "Let us make man in our image, and after our likeness." Genesis 1:26. The Triune Godhead, or Trinity, worked together in the creation of the world. God the Father was the planner, or designer, God the Son was the executor of the Father's plans, and is spoken of as the Word in John 1:1; God the Holy Spirit moved and performed the works of the Father's design when "The Spirit of God moved upon the face of the waters." Genesis 1:2.

We see the Godhead in the work of salvation. God planned the scheme of redemption and sacrificed his Son on the cross to die. The Son became flesh and lived and died on earth to become the propitiation for our sins. The Holy Spirit was sent by Christ when he returned to heaven, to convict the world of sin as the Spirit of truth confirming the Word of God the Father. See John 14:16; 16:8; and John 16:13.

Sift and measure flour. Add dry ingredients; sift again. Cut in shortening. Add milk and stir to soft dough. Turn onto floured board; knead 30 seconds. Roll into 8x12 inch rectangle. Cut into 4 rectangles, place on baking sheet. Pinch ends together to form "boats". Bake at 450° for 15 minutes.
