The Value of The Church

We find the scriptures plainly teaching that the Church is the Body of Christ. "And hath put all things under his (Christ's) feet, and gave him to be the head over all things to the church, which is his body, the fullness of him that filleth all in all." Ephesians 1:22,23. Is it not clear that to be saved outside of the church which Christ built, which is his body, one would have to be saved out of Christ? We have learned that this is not possible (Acts 4:12). How can we then be saved without being members of the church, the body of Christ?

Let us consider carefully the following Scriptures: (a) Christ promised to save his church (Eph. 5:23), hence salvation is promised only to those who are in the body of Christ. Will any deny that it is impossible to be saved out of Christ? (b) Christ shed his blood to purchase his church (Acts 20:28). Therefore, if we can be saved without being members of the institution for which he shed his blood, then his great sacrifice was unnecessary. (c) We are all reconciled to Christ in the one body (Eph. 2:16). Therefore, if we are not members of that one body, we have not been reconciled to Christ. (d) The act of baptism puts us into Christ, or into his body, the church, and we put on Christ in our lives. (Gal. 3:27). (e) All spiritual blessings in heavenly places are in Christ. (Eph. 1:3) If it were possible to be saved outside Christ's body, the church, the Calvary would be a wasted tragedy, and God, Christ, and the Apostles would all be false teachers. From the above evidence we must conclude that one cannot be saved outside of the church, which is his body. Would any honest and sincere man deny this?

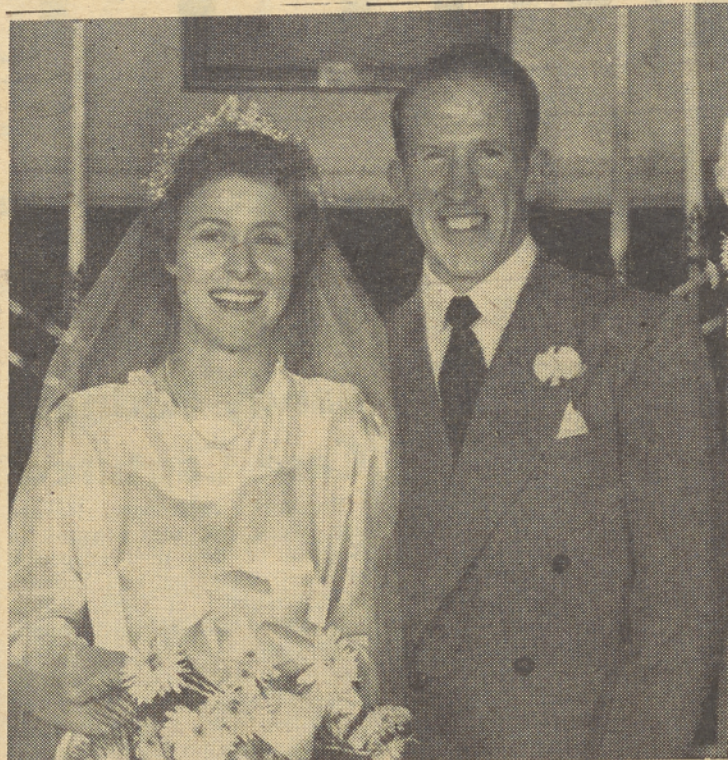
