Junior Symphony To Feature Portlander

The Portland Junior Symphony will present a concert under the baton of Guest Conductor Eugene Fuerst Saturday, February 23, at 8:30 p.m. in the public auditorium. The program will be the second performance in the three-yearly series which has been sponsored by the Junior Symphony association continuously during the past 28 years.

Star performer of the concert will be 17 year-old Walter Maddox, an outstanding young violinist who will play the Mendelssohn Violin Concerto. A Portland high school boy, he was chosen for the honor at auditions held by the Junior Symphony in early December. He is a music pupil of Frank Eichenlaub and a member of the Junior Symphony's first violin section.

Beethoven's third "Leonore" overture and Tchaikowsky's Symphony No. 5 in E minor, a favorite with concert-goers and the work which contains the popularized "Moonglow" melody, also will be performed by this nationally famous 80 piece youth orchestra.

"Children's Story of an Orchestra", a specially arranged work by Mr. Fuerst, will be presented on the morning of the same day when the orchestra plays its 11 o'clock Young People's Concert at the auditorium. The work uses fairy tale and heroic characters as depicted by the world's great composers, and is arranged in solo sections so that the various instruments of an orchestra will be demonstrated to the young audience. David Campbell will narrate the story, describing the composer's characters prior to each episode.

The morning audience also will hear the last movement of the Tchaikowsky symphony and young Maddox will perform the first movement of his evening solo.

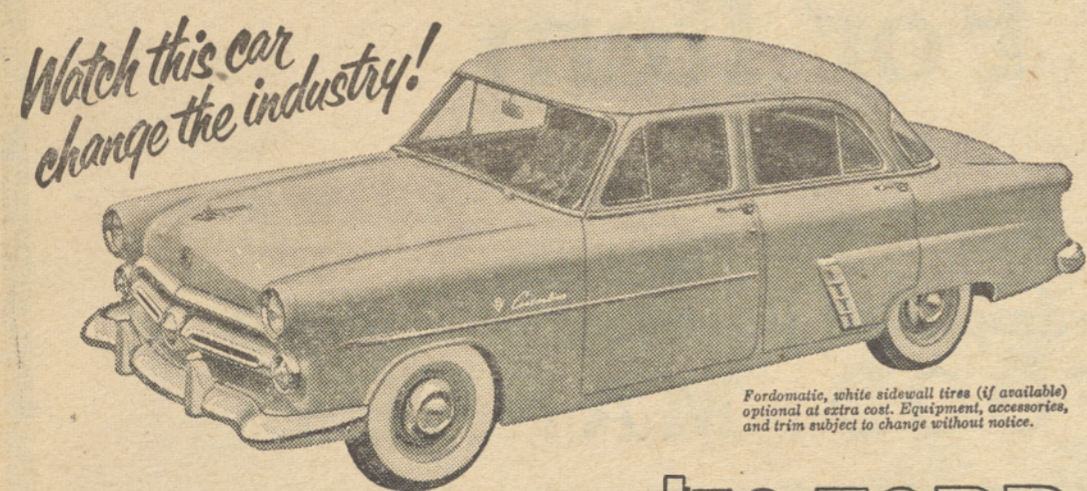

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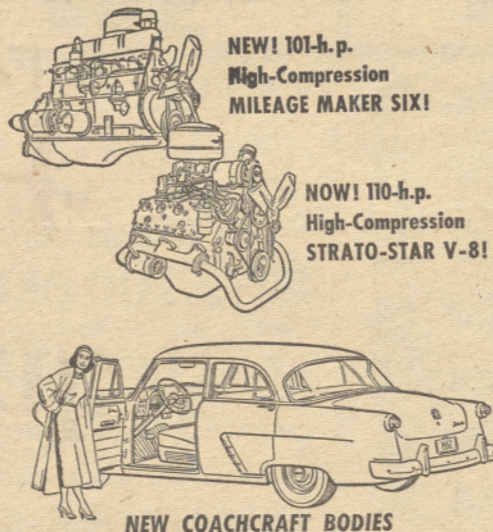
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
