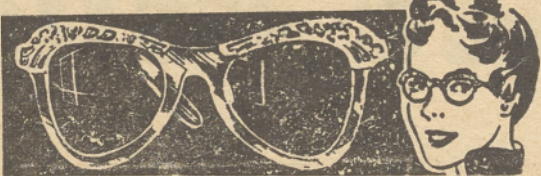

Portland Composer And Czech Pianist Featured By Symphony Orchestra

The brilliant young Czech pianist, Rudolph Firkusny, will make his first appearance with the Portland Symphony orchestra under James Sample, conductor, Monday night, March 3, at the civic auditorium.

Two other special attractions will be the premiere of the Overture to "Alice in Wonderland" by Portland's talented young composer, Robert Arenz, and the personal appearance of the Hollywood composer, Miklos Rozsa, who will conduct his suite for the film, "Quo Vadis."

Firkusny has appeared with major symphony orchestras in Europe and the United States. He has played with the Boston Symphony under Koussevitzky, with the New York Philharmonic, and under Sir Thomas Beecham at the Ravinia Festival.

In Portland, he will play Brahms' First Piano Concerto in D Minor. Firkusny was forced to leave Czechoslovakia in 1939 when the Nazis invaded his homeland.

Robert Arenz studied with Mrs. Jean McCracken in Portland. He later studied in Paris and elsewhere. The overture will be his first orchestral work to be performed in concert.

Rozsa is a native of Hungary who has made his home in Hollywood since 1941. He is a two-time Academy Award winner and has composed music for many notable films.

Tickets for the March 3 concert will be available at the J. K. Gill box office on and after February 28.
