

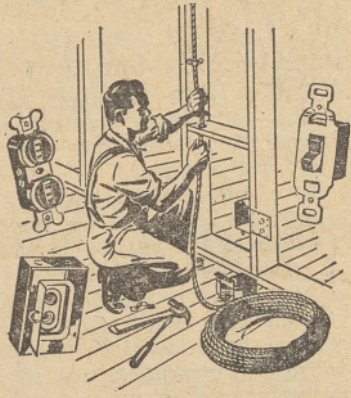

Sermon Topic: "The Gospel for an Age of Doubt."

This is the first in a series of pre-Easter sermons. Come and hear them all.

SING

Many people who know the Church of Christ wonder why we do not use instruments of music other than our human voices. Why is it that we do not use them? In the first place, we find no command, example, nor inference where they were ever used in the Church of the New Testament. Christ never instituted the use of them. Did he forget to, or did he intend to leave them out? You answer this question. We do find the command to sing. "... but be filled with the spirit, speaking one to another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody with your HEART to the Lord, Eph. 5:19." Again in Col. 3:16, "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; in all wisdom, teaching and admonishing one another with psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, SINGING with grace in your hearts unto God." No mention of the use of mechanical instruments in the worship can be found in the New Testament. Oh, but someone will say, "David used them under the Old Testament. Yes, and burnt offerings were made under the Old Testament too. There is as much authority for the use of one as the other. Besides, the Old Testament is not binding. He hath taken it out of the way. See Col. 2:14; Heb. 10:9.

Then again, we have a warning from the Apostle Paul against trying to be justified by the Old Testament or Law. Gal. 5:4; "Ye are severed from Christ, ye who would be justified by the law; ye are fallen away from grace." May we never be severed from Christ and fall away from grace!
