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Sandy To Get First JP Jury Trial 8 Years

Purchase Of Cow Basis For Civil Action By Gannon Against Pleiss

The first civil action to be tried by jury in the Sandy justice of the peace court in at least eight years is slated tentatively for Friday March 21 in the Sandy city hall, according to the justice of the peace court records.

The suit allegedly involves the purchase of a cow by D. A. Gannon from Tony Pleiss last October. The jury trial was requested by the defendant, Pleiss, who is represented by the law firm of Hammond & Hammond of Oregon City. Gannon is being represented by the Sandy law firm of Martin & Paterson.

The last civil action tried by a jury in the local justice of the peace court was during the days of world war II and involved the amount of filberts turned over to the defendant by the plaintiff for drying.

There has been at least one criminal trial in the justice of the peace court since the aforementioned case, but the Gannon-Pleiss case is the first civil action since that time.

State Asks Bids On Concrete Bridge

At its meeting on March 14, the State Highway Commission will receive bids for the construction of a 3-span, 156-foot reinforced concrete bridge over Eagle Creek and 0.89 mile of grading, rock base and paving approaches thereto on the Eagle Creek Section of the Clackamas Secondary Highway about three miles north of Estacada.

The new bridge will be about 1/4-mile upstream from the present structure on new alignment which will eliminate several sharp curves on the present route. The improvement calls for a 26-foot width bridge and a 20-foot roadway pavement 3 1/2 inches thick supported on a 14-inch rock base, with 5-foot rock shoulders on each side.
