**Republican Brice Seeks Nomination As County Sheriff**

Lloyd J. Brice, criminal investigator in the district attorney's office, is seeking the Republican nomination for sheriff of Clackamas county. Except for six years spent in Washington, he has lived in Oregon continuously since 1904. For the last three and a half years he has lived in Milwaukie district, at 8525 E. 32nd avenue.

Brice has had 33 years' experience in law enforcement, including work as city detective and chief deputy sheriff in Walla Walla, investigator for the Wil-



liam J. Burns Detective Agency, marksmanship and police instructor for the Division of Vocational Education, and investigator for the Oregon Liquor Control Commission. He was a member of the Oregon National Guard rifle team for nine years, taking part in national rifle and pistol matches at Camp Perry for six years. He says, "The sheriff is the highest law enforcing officer in the county and should be capable of taking the lead on important criminal investigations. He should co-operate fully with all other officers in the county, including the Oregon State Police. He should select deputies above the average in mental qualifications. These men should

be trained in all phases of modern police work.

"Prompt and efficient action should be taken on all criminal matters. We must restore public confidence in the sheriff's office.

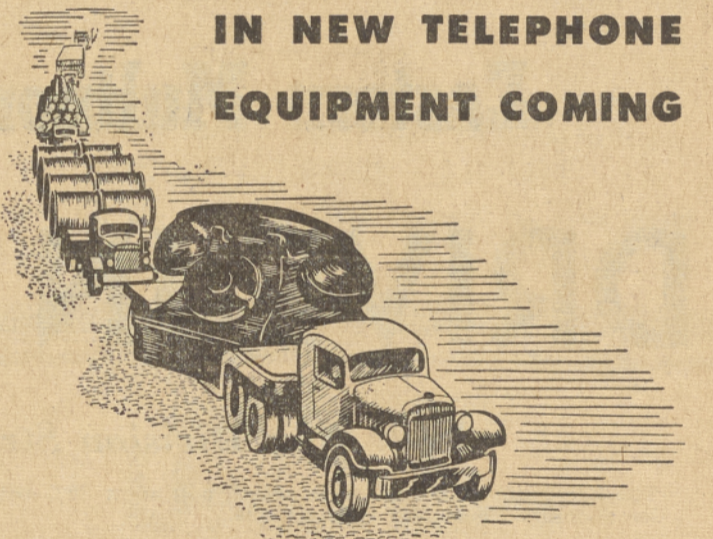
