"The Lord's Supper"

Jesus commanded his disciples to partake of, what we call, the Lord's Supper. "And he took bread, and gave thanks, and break it, and gave unto them, saying, This is my body which is given for you, this do in remembrance of me. Likewise also, the cup after supper, saying, this cup is the new testament in my blood, which is shed for you." Luke 22:19. The apostles and early disciples obeyed the command of Jesus by meeting on the first day of each week to commune with their Lord by eating the supper in commemoration. Acts 2:42; 20:7.

The purpose of the Lord's Supper is set forth by Paul in I Cor. 11:26; "For as often as ye eat this bread and drink this cup ye do show the Lord's death till he come." Hence, when saints assemble to partake, they have their minds fixed by faith upon two of the most transcendent events in the human scheme of redemption; the crucifixion of Christ and his glorious appearing the second time.

The purpose of the Lord's Supper suggests three main things to Christians. First, men are apt to forget their benefactors. We remember them for a little while, but as years go by, that warm, loving memory grows weaker and weaker. Our Lord, who died on dark Calvary, knew the weakness of men's minds. Second, as a means of grace, we assemble around this table, searching our hearts, correcting our lives, solemnizing our thoughts and purposes. Spiritual man is fed and given strength. Third, Saints who at the Supper of the Lord, observed in His Kingdom here, receive that pledge of the final gathering of the marriage supper of the Lamb of God.
