The Apostle Peter

The Apostle Peter was a man of zeal and leadership. He was a quick thinker and speaker. He was always ready to speak and act. Many times he took the floor to speak for the apostles as a group. Sometimes he spoke too quickly, without first thinking as he should have done. He was the first to vow that he would die with Jesus before he would see him put to death, but yet he was the very one who denied the Lord three times before the cock crew twice. (See Mark 14:72.) He was the first to speak out and confess Jesus to be the Christ the Son of God. See Matthew 16:18,19.

There are some people who believe that the Apostle Peter was superior to the other apostles. From our study of the sacred pages of the Bible we find that Peter was on the same level as the other apostles as far as divine superiority was concerned. He was a leader of men, quick to take the lead, but many times to be corrected for his errors. As on the Mount of Transfiguration, seeing Moses and Elijah with Christ, he spoke out and said, "Let us make three tabernacles, one for thee, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." A cloud overshadowed them and a voice spoke from it saying, "This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased, hear ye him," God showing to Peter that the time of listening to Moses and Elijah was over.

Peter was neither superior, nor more divine than the other apostles. No place in the Bible was he ever said to be the Chief Apostle. Peter was human in the same respect as the other apostles. He even had a wife as other of the disciples had. (See Matthew 8:14,15.) He had the same weaknesses of the flesh as the others. On one occasion he stood condemned, according to the Apostle Paul in Galatians 2:11. "But when Peter came to Antioch, I resisted him to the face, because he stood condemned." This was the Apostle Paul speaking. Paul withstood him to the face because of Peter's condition. Also the time when the mob came to take Jesus away to crucify him, Peter being human, drew his sword and cut off the ear of the servant of the High Priest. Peter was inspired by the Holy Spirit to speak the word of the Lord to the world, but within himself he was human.

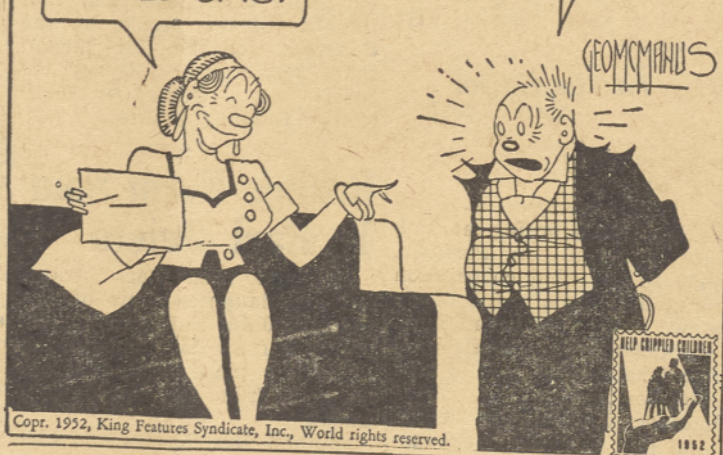
