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Falling From Grace

The grace of God is given to all men who obey Him. No man stands in the grace of God who does not obey his commandments. Of course God extended his grace to all men in giving his Son to die on the cross; "For the grace of God hath appeared bringing salvation to all men." Tim. 2:11. Jesus brought salvation to all men but he said, "Except ye believe that I am he, ye shall die in your sins." Therefore, a man must believe and obey the commandments of Jesus in order to stand in the grace of God. "Being therefore justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ; through whom also we have had access by faith into this grace wherein we stand; . . . Rom 5:1,2." From evidence throughout the Bible we know that it is possible to fall away from the grace of God. Gal. 5:4; "Ye are severed from Christ, ye who would be justified by the LAW; ye are fallen away from grace." Israel of old rebelled against the commandments of God and lost favor of grace in the eyes of God. Examples from the New Testament make it evident that one can fall from the grace of God. Judas, who was chosen in person by the Lord, fell from grace. Peter the Apostle, fell from grace, but repented and came back. Ananias and Sapphira, Christians in the Jerusalem Church, sinned and fell from the grace of the Lord by lying to God. See Acts 5. The writer of Hebrews admonishes all men in Hebrews 12:14,15, "Follow after peace with all men, and the sanctification without which no man shall see the Lord, looking carefully lest there be any man that FALLETH short of the grace of God . . ." The writer was writing to Christians.

Open the ice box, and lo, a luscious pudding is waiting to be eaten, just as pictured in the advertisements. Always, in the pictures, when the door is opened, all sorts of good things to eat are revealed—and this could be one of them.

Mrs. Bunnell's Ice Box Pudding

¾ C sugar, ¼ C milk, yolks of 3 eggs, 1 T cornstarch. Beat together and cook in double boiler until thick. Add 1 T vanilla, set aside.

Cream ¼ pound butter and 1 C confectioner's sugar. Add beaten whites of 3 eggs. Add to above custard. Add ½ C finely grated walnuts.

In a loaf pan place a layer of lady fingers or vanilla wafers, then a layer of filling. Top with lady fingers or wafers. Let stand in ice box 24 hours.
