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The Origin and History of EASTER

With the great majority of those who profess Christ, Easter has come to stand for the Resurrection. Yet Easter to many means nothing more than just a day that is declared by the nation to be a holiday. It should be no small matter of concern that it does not have its origin with Christ, the apostles, nor the early church; nor even with Judaism. If the fact that it does not have its origin in the Bible fails to cause us to hesitate, the fact that its origin rests in heathenism should. And even though there were no such stigma attached to it, yet would we find the New Testament condemn the practice of observing days and seasons. See Gal. 4:10; Col. 2:16-18.

Easter is supposed to be a continuation of the Jewish Passover some think, —but Easter is not Jewish. It is the essence of rarity to find a conjunction of these two dates. If Easter came at the time of Christ's death, it would always fall on the 14th of Nisan (the time of the Passover), but this is the very thing which it does not do. The year 1825 is the last time that Easter fell on the first day of the Passover. If one would make a study of the Jewish and Julian calendars, he would find that the two dates will not coincide again until some time after the year 2000. Therefore, we must conclude that it is not a continuation of the Jewish Passover. If it were, it would always fall on a certain day of the month, and not as it does, always on the first day of the week. (See article next week for further study.)

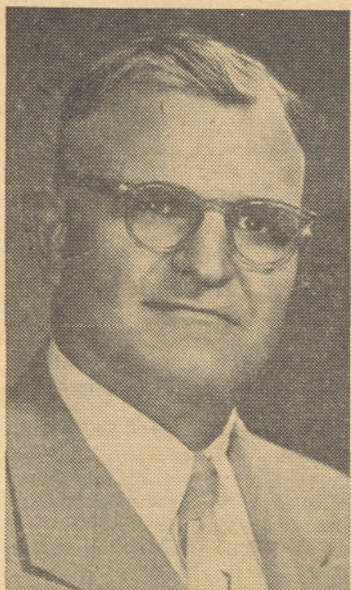
