The Sandy Post's Recipe Of The Week

Some of the pleasantest things in life are the easiest to have. Homemade bread, for instance. The odor alone is enough to fill the heart with contentment.

Etta McAnally makes a light, sweet smelling, tender crusty loaf, and how I enjoyed her hot rolls! Her recipe follows.

Etta McAnally's POTATO BREAD

Two C cold mashed potatoes, 2 C hot water, 2 T lard, 2 t salt, extra cup warm water, 1 pkg. yeast, 12 cups flour, 2 t sugar.

Pour ½ C lukewarm water on the yeast and add a teaspoonful of sugar. Let stand a few minutes.

Add 2 cups hot water to potatoes, lard, sugar and salt. Beat well. Let cool. Add yeast and



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4 cups flour. Let raise in warm place 1½ hours. Add six cups flour and beat. Put 2 cups flour on paper and add dough and knead until all flour is taken. Put in greased bowl and let raise until double. Push down and let raise again. Form into 3 loaves and let raise double. Bake one hour.

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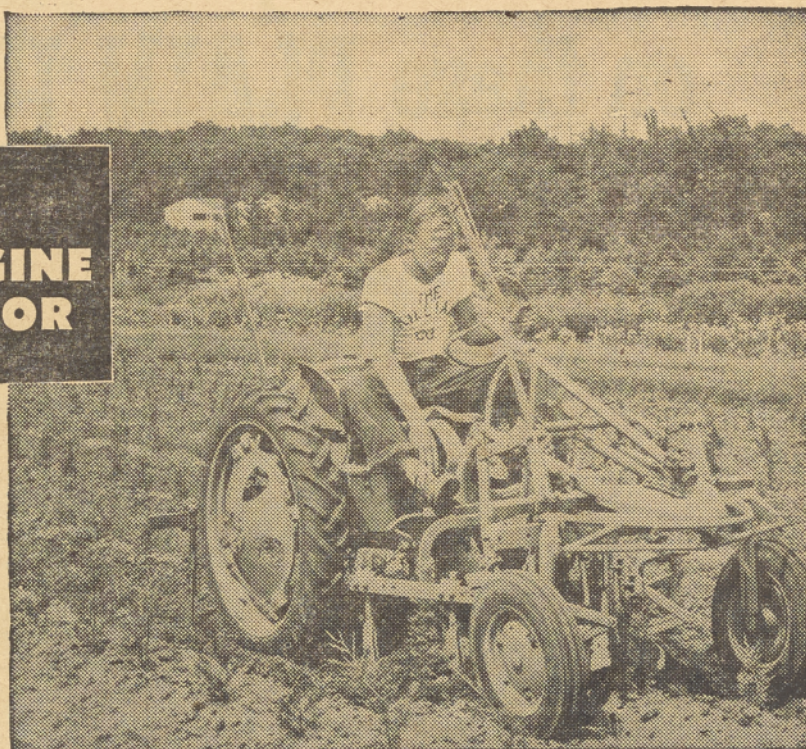
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
