Social Security Offers Workers "New Start"

Any person who has been in work covered by social security since January 1, 1951, and is now 65 years old has the advantage of a "new start." These "new-starters" should be vitally interested in social security beginning with April of this year.

Carmen Caster, Field Representative of the social security field office, pointed out that a great many employees will have acquired their necessary sixth quarter of coverage under the new law as soon as they have been paid \$50 after April 1. This means that many people who are now 65 will have enough employment after 1950 to have their old-age insurance figured under the new formula. Benefit payments to a retired worker will range from \$20 to \$80 monthly.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that an election will be held in School District No. 46 of Clackamas County, state of Oregon, from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m., Standard Time, on June 30, 1952, at the schoolhouse in said school district, for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said district the question of increasing the tax levy for the fiscal year 1952-1953 over the amount limited by Section 11, article XI, of the Constitution of Oregon.

The reasons for increasing such levy are:

Since the Rural School District has taken over our tax base, all tax voted is outside the 6% limitation; also increased cost of operation.

The amount of tax, in excess of the 6% limitation, proposed to be levied for said fiscal year is \$27,379.05.

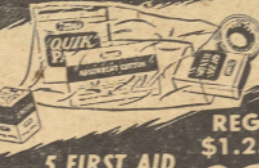
