## Navy Man Arrives

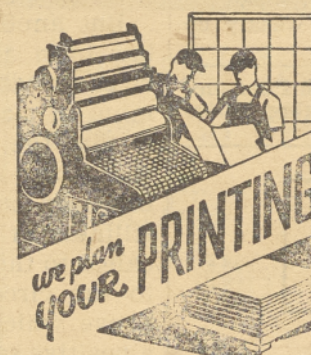
