SERMON TOPIC: "Making Life Worth While." Certainly everyone who thinks wants to live a worth while life. This sermon may give you some suggestions. Hear it.

Was Jesus Infallible

By infallible we mean "impossible to err; impossible to sin; impossible to fall." In this sense the Bible plainly teaches that Jesus was not infallible; it was possible for him to sin while he lived on the earth from his birth until his death. The scriptures teach that Jesus took on himself the form of man and "was tempted in all points like as we are, yet without sin." (Heb. 4:15) Satan tempted Jesus while in the wilderness (Luke 4). If Jesus was infallible; impossible for him to sin, there would not have been any temptation. Satan knew Jesus to be the Son of God; would he have been so foolish as to waste his time trying to tempt Jesus if it were impossible for him to be tempted; he would have known that too. Jesus was hungry having fasted forty days, therefore, food was temptation to him. He was void of popularity and friendship; he was tempted to receive the pride of life. He lived in poverty, by his own choice, thus riches could have tempted him. "For he was tempted in all points like as we..." Heb. 4:15.

Again, Jesus came to earth to prove himself capable of resisting temptation and to die for the sins of the world. There would have been no proving had he been infallible to begin with. After Jesus had proven himself, God the Father said, "This is my beloved Son in whom I am well pleased." Jesus did live a life above sin; but that does not mean that it was impossible for him to have committed sin. He lived a perfect example before us in resisting temptations to sin.
