THE NEW BIRTH

There are not many subjects in the Bible in which much of the religious world is any more confused over than The New Birth. There is no real reason why man should be confused over this subject, if he will but study his Bible. We all know that in the process of propagation there must always be the two sexes to make it possible. Likewise there are the two elements in the new birth. There must be the male begetter and there must be the female birth giving element. In John 3:3-5 Jesus said, "Except one be born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." In that scripture there are both the elements necessary for the new birth. "Water" in the Greek language (first language the New Testament was written in) is always feminine in gender; and the Spirit is always masculine in gender. Thus, without either element the new birth is not possible. The Holy Spirit does the begetting and the water gives forth the birth. That is why the Apostle Paul said in Romans 6:4; "We were buried therefore with him through baptism into death; that like as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, so we also might walk in newness of life. For if we have become united with him in the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection." See also Acts 2:38; 1 Peter 3:20, 21. Again in Titus 3:4, 5 Paul said, "... but according to his mercy he saved us, through the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Spirit." Cleansed and purified by faith in baptism and renewed to life by the Holy Spirit. And again Paul said in Ephesians 5:25, 26; "... having cleansed it by the washing of water with the word."

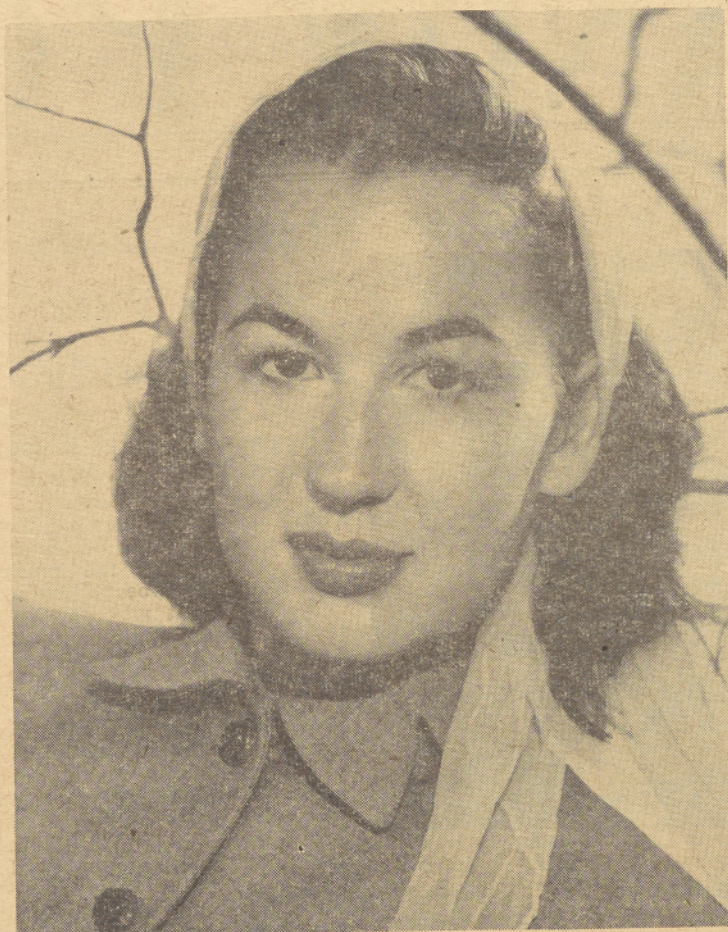

State Pack Would Equal More Than 1000 Mount Hoods

The fruits and vegetables produced and packed in Oregon for consumers everywhere last year, if stacked case on case, would equal more than 1,000 giant columns each rising as high as Mt. Hood, highest peak in the state.

Mathematical calculations using standard case measurements verify that the pack of 13,737,061 cases of fruits and vegetables produced last year by the state's farmer, canner and can-making team would form these mountains of food, according to E. G. Gross, Oregon representative of American Can company.

"The need for quickly packing this huge volume of food, which is far beyond the capacity of Oregon and neighboring states to consume, has made the production of containers and the canning and processing of food one of the most important industries in the state," said Mr. Gross, whose firm supplies millions of the containers used by canners in the state.

The leading vegetables and fruits canned in Oregon include snap beans, sweet peas, beets, plums, pears and cherries.

Letter Written In '80 Gives Insight Into Early Day Home Life

While doing some spring cleaning, straightening out boxes, etc., I came across a letter written October 8, 1880 from Mary Ann to Ben, somewhere in Oregon, near Hermiston I think.

One thing she says is, "I was glad, very glad to hear you had got yourself sum worm close. I feel the good of them just as much as if I had them myself."

They took a grist mill and got \$25, the second \$25 and Mary Ann bought four pairs of boots and shoes, stockings and stocking yarn, flannel for shirts and a good many other things "for all of us which sune made the money small." Then later on she says, "Now my dear Ben, you need not send me anymore money till you come home. I have got plenty. I am rich now." With the change from \$25?

But read the letter in its entirety for yourself.

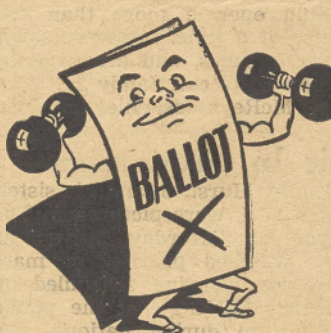
October the 8, 1880

My own dear Ben

It is sunday agin and i am agoing to write to you agin feeling sure my letters is a well come visiter to you as yours is to me. Mrs. romine was in town last thursday and brought me two ear welcome letters from you. i was disappointed when i hurd i was not going to see you quite so sune as i expected but never minde my lad i have sence enough to know it is for our good you have to be away. there is no work to be got, here for cash and we need money. i was glad very glad to hear you had got your self sum worm close. i feel the good of them just as much as if i had them my self. i hope i shell see you with them new pants and hat you promised to get and i was happer still to heare your health was beter for that is the gratest comfort

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to me as well as your self. well Ben, John come home Friday to take a grist mill and i went with him and got the second 25 dollars you our fatheful husband and father true as steel i often wish i could do something more to help you and take some of the birdins of your shoulders now that you are not so able to bear it as you was once. we must try to make a little with our chickens or sune other way in sid of all hard work. well i had the boys all with me and got four pare of boots and shoes stoken and stoken yarn flanel for shirts and a good many other things for all of us wich sune made the money small but i neade not tell you that. when we was comeing home johrie sat betwin us and drove humleoust(?) and miny you may amegen how he feit about it. he wanted me to tell papa. tom wants me to tell papa what lydia said when we understood you was not comeing home as sune as we expected. thay all had sune falt to finde about it. lydia who was fealing rather cross at the time said i wish that dickens of a papa wold come home and when they made sune remark about it she sayed no not dickens papa but good papa come home so you see she seam to under stand the meaning of the two words. John went back to clances this morning they are still puting in grain. he has not halled any of his wheat yet. we have had no nuse from the valey. did you ansure james pauls letter i sent you. and now my dear Ben you nead not send me eny more money till you come home i have got plenty i am rich now.

Do not walk that long sandy rode try to get a ride. no more at present from your ever loving wife and children Mary Ann. now i have got those rote i wish you was here to direct it doant you laugh at my scrieels on the envelope. tell papa to come home sune.

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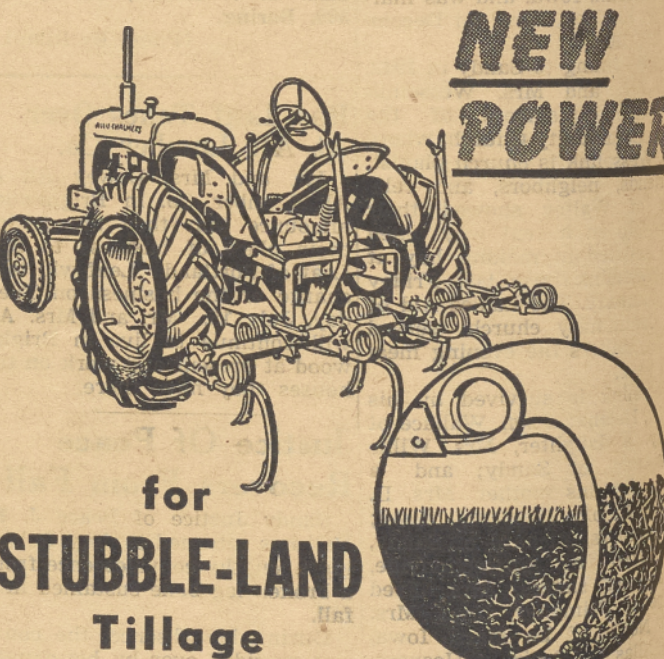
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
