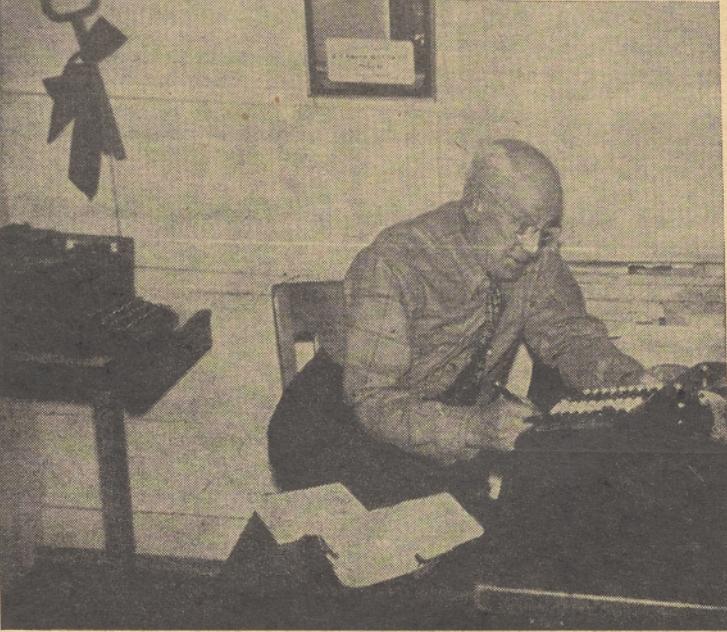

Many Clackamas County People To Receive Higher Security Payments

About 3000 people in Clackamas county will receive higher social security payments beginning early in October as a result of the social security amendments which President Truman signed into law July 18.

Carmen Caster, field representative of the Portland social security office, emphasized that no one needs to apply for the increased payments. "The Social Security administration is already changing the amounts," she pointed out. "They will be changed in time to be on the checks to be mailed October 3, the regular delivery date, but in a few cases that schedule is not met the regular check will be mailed and the difference made up in a later check."

Miss Caster pointed out that although nearly every family receiving payments will receive an increase, the additional amount will not always be divided among all the members of the family receiving monthly checks.

In some cases the entire increase will go to the retired worker.

\$6 Increase

Amount of the increase for a retired worker will range from \$5 to \$8.60, with the average about \$6. Where several members of a family are receiving payments, the total increase to the family can be as much as \$18.90. A few benefits now being paid, and most of those payable in the future, will be based on earnings after 1950 instead of after 1936. The amended law provides a new formula for determining the amount of the payments in these cases. Under it, a retired worker's monthly benefit would be 55 per cent of the first \$100 of his average monthly earnings plus 15 per cent of the remainder up to \$300. The maximum monthly benefit for a wage earner then will be \$85; the minimum, \$25.

New Law

Beginning September 1, the new law increased to \$75 a month instead of \$50 the amount of money a beneficiary may earn and still receive the monthly benefits. Self-employed people entitled to old-age and survivors insurance benefits may receive the payments for each month of the year if their net earnings during the entire year are not over \$900.

The amended law contains a provision of special importance to self-employed people who have retired or plan to retire during 1952. Before the passage of the amendments their earnings for the year in which an application was made could not be used to figure their old-age benefit payments. Now, those self-employed people who originally applied for benefits in 1952 may re-apply at the close of the taxable year and have their 1952 earnings used in figuring their monthly benefit payments. In general, this will increase the monthly benefit payment to self-employed persons.

Retiring Wage Earners

A similar change in the law now permits insured wage earners who retire in 1952 to have their wages for this year used immediately in figuring the amount of their benefit payments. Heretofore, it was necessary for them to come back after the end of the year in order to have all of their covered wages for 1952 included in the computation of the benefit amount.

Another amendment allows beneficiaries aged 75 or over already on the rolls to take advantage of the higher benefit payments provided under the new formula, if they have had

at least a year and a half of covered work after 1950.

Credits To Servicemen
The amended law allows social security wage credits of \$160 for each month of active military or naval service after July 24, 1947. This provision is simply an extension of the one which already gives social security wage credit to servicemen of World War II. It applies to service in the armed forces up to January 1, 1954.

Of advantage to the survivors of deceased service people is a provision in the amended law extending the time for claiming a lump-sum death payment. This applies to servicemen who die abroad and are later returned to the United States for burial or reburial. Survivors who pay the burial expenses may now claim reimbursement up to two years after the reburial instead of two years after the serviceman's death.

Miss Caster will be at The Sandy Post August 8, between 10 and 12, to give assistance to those wishing to file claim for social security benefits and secure information on the program.

Former Sandy Grade Graduate Given Scholarship

Thaxter "Tack" Goodell, 18, who graduated from Sandy grade school in 1948, has been awarded the Naval Reserve Officer's Training Corps scholarship, which amounts to a four year course at the college of his choice which is Stanford University. "Tack" has been admitted to Stanford and upon completion of his training there will have a rating of Ensign in the United States Navy.

About 180 from Oregon sought this award and 21 were approved by the Navy, six from Portland and two from Jefferson high school, where "Tack" graduated. "Tack" entered Jefferson high school in Portland in 1948, where he played football, baseball and basketball. In football he was given the All Star honorable mention for 1951-52.

He was an honor student and a member of the National high school honor society and finished Jefferson with straight "ones." He was a junior class officer, and was elected student body president in the fall of 1951.

As student body president he was sent to Wellesley, Massachusetts as a delegate to the National Convention of student body officers. At this convention he conducted one of the discussion group and was instrumental in bringing the convention to Portland in 1953.

He was president of the Portland Inter-Student Council and vice-president of the Oregon Council of student body officers.

Awarded Al Goss Cup

He was graduated as an honor student and valedictorian for the class, and was awarded the Al Goss cup, the highest honor to be given a Jefferson graduate. This cup is usually given to the year's two student body presidents jointly, but was given to "Tack" alone for the full year for the first time. The cup is for leadership, scholarship, and best all around contribution to the school.

"Tack" was awarded the International Relations league plaque for the best citizen at Jefferson high.

Earlier in the year he won the Oregon high school "after dinner" speech contest at the State contest in Eugene for which he was awarded a cup.

The four years scholarship is valued in excess of \$5,000. "Tack" is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Myron H. Goodell. Mr. Goodell is employed at Meier & Frank Co. in Portland.

Chiffon Cakes To Be Featured At County Fair

The newest and most revolutionary cake baking method yet devised, that method employed in baking chiffon cakes, will be one of the features of the culinary arts competition at the 46th annual Multnomah county fair, August 18-24.

Many, many years were spent developing an easier-to-bake, quicker-to-bake but yet more moist foam-type cake. The result was the chiffon cake.

It was accomplished by the simple expedient of employing a cooking or salad oil rather than the conventional type of cake shortening.

Because the cake is so unique both in preparation and result, it will occupy a separate category during fair week.

Winner of the chiffon cake competition will receive a gleaming silver-plated cake plate. Second prize cake will gain its baker a recently published picture cook book and silver-plated cake server will be awarded the third place winner.

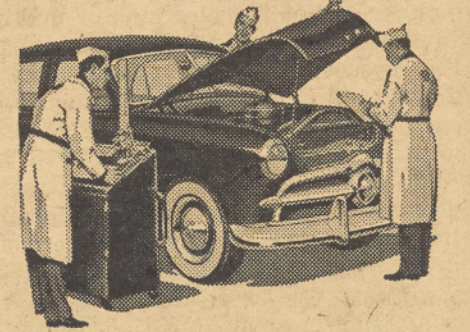
